Cases Adjourned in Magistrate's Court in Scurie

Mr. Kichham To Take Action Against Cpl. Strong For Assault.

Yesterday before Stipendiary Magistrate J. W. MacDonald in Scurie the case against Mr. T. J. Kichham, Federal member for King's who has been charged with obstructing a police officer, was adjourned until 2 p. m. Thursday, Nov. 2. No plea was taken and no evidence heard. Mr. L. P. O'Donnell appeared for Mr. Kichham and Mr. S.S. Hessian, K.C. for the Crown. Mr. M. J. McQuaid represented the Town of Scurie.

Mr. Kichham, following his arrest last Friday night, was released on \$100 bail posted by Mr. J. Brenton St. John, M.L.A. The arrest was the result of a fracas in which Mr. Kichham reportedly sought to obtain the release from R.C.M.P. custody of two men arrested for causing a disturbance.

Mr. O'Donnell said that acting for Mr. Kichham he was serving notice that Mr. Kichham proposed, after the expiry of the required 30 days, to take action against Cpl. Lionel Strong of the R. C. M. P. for assault.

Also charged with obstructing a police officer in connection with the same incident were Messrs. Walter J. MacDonald, Percy O'Hanley and Claude O'Hanley. Mr. MacDonald yesterday entered a plea of not guilty and his case was adjourned until Nov. 2 without evidence being heard.

The case against the O'Hanleys, who were not represented by counsel, was adjourned until Oct. 26, no plea being taken yesterday.

October Sitting County Court At Georgetown

The October sitting of the County Court, King's County, Fifth Circuit, was held in the Court House at Georgetown on Tuesday, October 17th at 1:00 A.M., with Judge S. J. DesRoches presiding. Ten cases were on the docket. The first three cases were adjourned from a previous sitting of the Court. The first case was a claim for damages to the plaintiff's motor vehicle. This case was adjourned at the request of counsel to a date to be fixed.

The second case involving Kings and Queens County residents, was a claim for money due on a contract, and was also adjourned at counsel's request to a date to be fixed.

The next case between King's County parties was for wrongful taking and conversion and this case was also adjourned at counsel's request to a date to be set. The next case on the docket was that of a King's County School district claiming arrears in school taxes from a ratepayer and resulted in judgment in favour of the plaintiff for the amount claimed and costs. The trustees of Georgetown Royalty School District applied for judgment against six parties for arrears in school taxes. Judgment was given in favour of the district in two of the cases.

The remaining four cases were adjourned to allow the secretary of the district an opportunity to procure the present addresses of the parties concerned. Court was adjourned sine die.
