Great Victory in Nova Scotia.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

HALIFAX, Sept. 16, 1878.

The Liberal-Conservatives have a majority of fifty. As far as heard from, in Nova Scotia, Richey and Daly, Halifax, have been elected with a majority of eight hundred; McDonald and Doull, Pictou, with majority of three hundred; Ogden, Guysboro', a majority of over one hundred; McLeod and McDonald, Cape Breton, eight hundred of a majority; Kaulbach, Lunenburg, seven hundred of a majority; McKay, Colchester, four hundred; Tupper, Cumberland, six hundred; Longley, Annapolis; Wade, Digby; Bell, Queen's, and Allison, Hants, by smaller majorities. Inverness and Victoria, doubtful; Antigonish, Yarmouth, Shelburne, King's and Richmond, have gone Grit by very small majorities.

We have carried twenty-eight out of thirty-eight local seats. The following prominent Grits were utterly routed: Mackenzie, Premier; Cartwright, Finance Minister; Coffin, Receiver-General; Laflamme, Minister of Justice; Dymond, John McDonald, Toronto; Lord, Aylmer, (Richmond and Wolfe), and many other lesser lights.

We have carried Ontario by good majorities. Immense enthusiasm. Nova Scotia sends hearty congratulations on your glorious victory.

The Government is utterly annihilated. We lost Kingston, Niagara North, and South Ontario, and Northumberland, New Brunswick.

LONDON, Sept. 16.

It is reported that Lord Cairns, Lord High Chancellor, is about to be created Earl Cairns. Parliament has prorogued to 30th of November.

CALCUTTA, Sept. 16.

The floods have destroyed upwards of 1,000 houses in the Julinder district of the Punjab.

BERLIN, Sept. 16.

The debate was opened in the Reichstag to-day on the anti-Socialist Bill. Herr Reichsapplagen, Ultramontane leader, declared himself opposed to the bill, but said that his friends would not meet in a purely negative spirit, and he wished to have it referred to a Committee.

Herr Bebel (Socialist) denied that there was any connection between attempts against the Emperor's life and Socialism. He declared that Socialists did not desire the abolition of property, but only its modification. Count Von Enlburgh showed that Nobling had declared himself a Socialist. The Socialistic press had defended him and had approved of murders in Russia. Herr Bambege (Liberal) supported the bill. He thought Herr Bebel's speech an incontrovertible proof of the necessity of taking measures against Socialism. He desired that the bill, however, be united in operation to a certain time and be otherwise amended. He moved that it be referred to a committee of twenty-one members. The debate was then adjourned.

A Pesth dispatch says it is firmly believed there that a treaty will be concluded whereby Serbia, in consideration of a subsidy of 259,000 roubles monthly, undertakes to maintain 400,000 men on the Albania or any other frontier that Russia may appoint.

A Vienna dispatch says it is clearly intended to crush the resistance in Bosnia by overwhelming masses. It is rumored that one-half of the Austrian army will be employed.

Another Vienna dispatch states that Berks on the Save is being bombarded and it is hoped will surrender to-morrow. Russia has urged Austria to declare the annexation of Bosnia.

BOSTON, Sept. 16.

The reports from the fever stricken States this morning are of a more hopeful character. The record during the past twenty-four hours shows an encouraging decrease both in the number of deaths and new cases.

In Memphis there were but 90 deaths and a falling off in new cases over the previous twenty-four hours of 60.

Forty-nine deaths occurred in New Orleans and 159 new cases are reported—a gratifying reduction of the previous day's record.

The death rate at various places in the Mississippi has also very materially lessened.
