God appears to Moses as a burning bush, telling him he is chosen to lead the Hebrews from Egypt and giving detailed instructions for this accomplishment.—Exodus 3.

Moses, with Aaron as his spokesman, reluctantly returns to Egypt to deliver the Hebrews from bondage.—Exodus 4.

GOD CALLS MOSES

TODAY we are studying of three events marking the most notable period in 800 years of Hebrew history: Moses' struggle with the pharaoh, the Exodus, and the giving of the Law at Sinai—all of which took place in a two-year period.

There is nothing about the birth of Moses to indicate his future greatness; in fact, so obscure was his beginning, his parents' names are unmentioned until the 6th chapter of Exodus. We are told only that at birth he was a goodly child—goodly meaning "fair to God" and an ornament that God had a great future in store for him.

ment is brushed aside with God's revelation of identity in one of the greatest statements concerning Himself to be found in all of the Scriptures (Exodus 3:14-16). Then God proceeds with further, detailed instructions for the removal of the Israelites from Egypt.

Unconvinced, Moses now raises a series of objections as to which carry any weight with the Lord. But to confirm and seal the divine origin of his call, and to assure him that God will keep His promises and Moses will have adequate strength and wisdom for every emergency, God gives him three signs.

Though Moses persists in his reluctance to accept God's assignment, the argument is finished. God has met every handicap Moses could honestly refer to, and He has given him an equipment beyond that which Moses himself would ever have dared ask for. There is nothing left for Moses to do but begin carrying out this program of God; or else flatly refuse to do it and live a life of perpetual disobedience.

This Moses was unable to do. He returns to Egypt where he is joined by his brother Aaron, from whom he has been separated for 40 years and who is to be his spokesman and co-worker. Together they set out to inform the Israelites of what God is about to do for them.

Church Leaders Confer With Bible Societies

Nearly 75 leaders, drawn from 12 different Churches, ranging from Brethren and Methodists to Roman Catholics and Orthodox, met in conference with representatives of the United Bible Societies, at Driedberg, H. O. Land, in June, 1964.

The conference was convened by Dr. F. D. Congdon, Archbishop of York, as President of the UBS. It was planned as part of the 150th Anniversary celebrations of the Church and Bible Societies to consider the place of the Bible in the world today, and to discover ways in which the Church and the Bible Societies can co-operate more fully in world evangelism.

The Rt. Rev. R.K. Macrae, Bishop of Montreal, the Rev. Dr. T.R. Davies of Hamilton and the Rev. Dr. Kenneth G. McMillan, General Secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, were the Canadian members of the church leaders from 48 countries who met in Driedberg. The conference was seeking answers to problems posed to the churches and the Bible Societies by the religious crisis of the 20th century, planning on a world scale for at least the next decade.
