

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

THE ISLAND STEAMERS.—The steamer Northumberland goes on the slip at Pictou to-day. During her absence the St. Lawrence will ply on the Summerside-Pictou-Chesapeake route.

LOST THE HORSE.—Mr. Wyle Clark lost a valuable horse last Friday evening. The animal was in pasture at the west of the town and the express passing in the evening frightened him. In attempting to jump the fence he fell on a stake which entered his abdomen. Inflammation set in and during the night the horse died. Summerside Pioneer.

THE CONCERT.—We present to our readers to-day the excellent programme of the concert to be given in the Philharmonic Hall on Thursday evening next, by the pupils of Mr. Earle's music school, assisted by several talented ladies and gentlemen. EPISCOPAL VISITATION.—His Lordship Bishop Courtney is expected here in a day or two. He will be present at the jubilee services in St. Peter's Cathedral on Sunday next. On that day he will preach both morning and evening and administer the Sacrament of Confirmation in the afternoon. His Lordship will then visit the other Anglican churches throughout the Island.

ST. DUNSTON'S CATHEDRAL.—The annual distribution of prizes to the boys of the Christian Doctrine classes took place in St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday afternoon in the presence of a goodly number of the parents and friends of the children. The prizes were distributed by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald after the exercises. His Lordship and Rev. Father Reid made brief addresses.

THE FASTNET.—The steamer Fastnet left here for Summerside on Saturday afternoon with a cargo which included 59 bbls. alewives, 238 cases lobsters, 4 cattle, and 25 bbls. pork. She left Summerside this morning for Halifax, where she goes in the dry dock to ascertain the extent of the injuries she sustained at Canoe Cove, and to have any necessary repairs made. The City of Glen leaves Halifax this evening and will be due here on Tuesday evening or Wednesday morning. She will take the cargo left behind by the Fastnet, and any other freight that offers.

FOR ST. ANNE.—This morning about thirty or forty persons left Charlottetown on a pilgrimage to St. Anne de Beaupre, Quebec, in charge of Father Azeviah, of Memramook. At Summerside the pilgrims were joined by about one hundred and fifty others. At Point du Chene the pilgrims were to embark on a special train which runs right through to Lewis, whence they cross by ferry to Quebec, and go from thence to St. Anne's, twenty-two miles distant, by train, arriving there about 2 p. m. on Tuesday. The pilgrims remain at St. Anne's all night on Wednesday, when they return to Quebec, where they will have six hours in which to visit the different points of interest in and about the city. At 7 o'clock they leave Lewis for home, reaching Summerside and Charlottetown on Thursday evening.

ODDFELLOWS MEMORIAL DAY.

The Oddfellows Decorate the Graves of Deceased Brethren. YESTERDAY afternoon the members of the two City Lodges of Oddfellows formed in procession at Oddfellows Hall and headed by Galbraith's Band proceeded to the cemeteries where they decorated the graves of those of the brethren who had "gone before." Each member of the Order wore a badge of the Order and a badge of the lodge to which he belonged. The graves were decorated with flowers and garlands. The ceremony was very imposing. One of the emblematical links and a large banner was placed on each grave. The old Protestant cemetery on the Malpeque road was first visited and the grave of Brother Joseph H. Davidson decorated, the ceremony being recited by Henry S. Coffin, N. G., and Fred. H. Sells, of St. Lawrence Lodge, Bro. W. A. Hawley, N. G. of Wilely Lodge, Bro. F. S. Chasler, T. W. of Wilely Lodge, Bro. J. A. Henderson, J. F. Henderson, and G. Walter Beer, At the People's cemetery the grave of W. B. Allen, C. V., McGregor, F. S. Chasler, T. W. of Wilely Lodge, A. D. White and John D. Curran were decorated, the services being spoken by W. C. Turner, T. W. of Chappelle, W. H. Borden, A. J. Housie and T. Goodwill. Appropriate hymns were sung at each grave.

At the People's Cemetery, after the decoration services had been concluded, the brethren formed a circle, and after appropriate music for the band, a brief account of the deceased members by Theo. L. Chappelle, P. G. M., and an able address by Grand Representative Bremner, the celebration was brought to a close.

Along the line of march the streets were lined with spectators and large numbers congregated at the various cemeteries to witness the decoration ceremonies which were highly appreciated. The weather was just what could be desired, but one could not help remarking that had the watering cart preceded the procession it would have been an improvement.

At Summerside the members of Prince Edward Lodge visited the cemetery at St. Eleonore in the morning and the St. Ann's cemetery in the afternoon, where the services were held and an able discourse delivered by Rev. Brother Alfred Osborne, D. D. The reverend gentleman was former a member of Wilely Lodge of this city.

TWO MEN MISSING

From a Lobster Factory at Canoe Cove—The Worst Feared. Two men named Art Rogerson and McMillan are missing from Farquharson & Stewart's lobster factory at Canoe Cove. They went out to attend to their traps on Saturday afternoon. When last seen they were about eight miles from land. A storm came up suddenly, and it is feared their boat upset and they were drowned. A boat was reported bottom up near St. Peter's Island yesterday evening.

Some of the other boats belonging to the factory reached land with great difficulty. One man named McQuarrie dropped anchor and rode out the storm all night, making land yesterday morning.

Since writing the above we hear that the missing men turned up at Belle Creek at noon yesterday, and reached home today. They had a hard struggle for their lives. Several times their boat was almost swamped, and the poor men suffered severely from exposure.

AN IMPROVEMENT SUGGESTED.

Sir.—The citizens have once more planted and boxed trees along the sides of Great George and other streets, hoping that they will not be destroyed as formerly. Certainly nothing would be more beautiful and healthful than avenues of trees along our principal streets, and the persistent efforts on the part of our public spirited men to bring this about is most commendable. Now that they have once more placed trees in position, would it not be well to discover the cause that has invariably led to their destruction in the past, and by removing it, to ensure the success of the present undertaking. It is useless to blame a spirit of vandalism for the misfortunes of the past, for, as a matter of fact, nearly every tree has been broken down by accident. The reason is this: When calling at a house, it is usual and generally necessary to drive up close to the wooden sidewalk. In doing so, by a little carelessness the young trees are caught between the wheels of the carriage, and destroyed. The only proper way to remedy this is to move the sidewalks out to the edge of the street. If this were done, three advantages would accrue: 1st, The trees would be better protected. 2nd, The plot between the sidewalk and the houses could be kept green with grass. 3rd, The windows of the houses would be removed further from the passers by, thereby giving the occupants more comfort and privacy. This system is followed with success in all modern cities such as Boston.
