LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Gas Light or Electric Light?

Sir,—I am a stockholder in the Gas Company to the extent of fifty shares—one of the original shareholders. When we started the Company, the kerosene furnaces of oil had not been tapped. We thought it was a safe and progressive investment and reasonable profits certain, as there was no competing light at that time, except the tallow and spermacandles, fish oils and a very dangerous compound called Benzine.

The Company had hardly got into working order before kerosene was discovered, and to use an old saying, it knocked the Company into a "cocked hat." We could not compete with kerosene and make profits in our small city; but the Company struggled on. No dividends were paid for about ten years or so, but we were looking forward for better times. During the past five years the prospects of the Company have improved. The directors have been able to pay dividends of about 2 1/2 per cent on the common stock of the Company in addition to improving our plant, and we looked forward to the time when we would be able to reduce the price of gas so as to bring it into more general consumption. But! Science has furnished another illuminator. It is manifest that the "electric light" will, to a great extent, be the light of the future. The City Fathers, although they have refused to give us water—that prime necessity—were determined that we should not lack light, and selected the electric light at a higher cost than gas for lighting our streets and squares; and gave a five years contract to a "Mr. Starr" who represented himself as the agent of the Electric Light Co.—as a matter of fact there was no such company in existence, and Mr. Starr was simply a "speculator." The City Fathers were ungrateful enough to forget the large sums of money the Gas Co. had expended in our midst, and the number of people they had employed in prosecuting their profitless business; and as a new broom is said to sweep clean, they pitched us overboard, and did not, I think, give the Gas Company fair play.

I think it will be admitted that the streets and squares of the city have not been as well lighted since the advent of the electric light as under the gas system. Under the gas system, all of our streets and squares had a fair share of the light; under the electric system of 37 globe or arc lights, some favored citizens residing on our principal streets and squares have a brilliant light, while those on the narrower streets running east and west and on the outskirts of the city are left, during the dark of the moon, in darkness. It seems to me that a combined system of electric lights for the broad streets and squares, and gas lamps for the narrower streets running east and west would be the best. Under the electric light system the minority of citizens get an improved light, the majority are left in almost total darkness, although they contribute to the cost equally with the favored few!

Science has succeeded in distributing the electric light "in jets" similar to gas lights, called "incandescent lights." The "Yanks" are quick to take advantage of scientific discoveries. They have been down here and have bought out Mr. Starr's interest in the electric lights. They have been "patriotically" aided by one of our wealthy citizens, who has "planked down" \$25,000 to float the new company. Their object is transparent. Under the incandescent system they hope to get the lighting of the churches, public rooms and east and west streets, and to "play out" the Gas Company, and very probably look forward to acquiring the Gas Works at their own price, when they would have almost a monopoly of lighting the city. Now, I say to the directors and shareholders of the Gas Company, "wake up!" An outlay of \$15,000 more or less will enable you to establish the electric and incandescent lights on your Gas Works premises. You can run the Electric Light in conjunction with gas, cheaper than a company depending solely on the Electric Light. At present gas is a dear light; but it is the best. I have it in every room in my house, but I can only afford to use it sparingly. I use a good deal of kerosene oil for ordinary purposes; I never use kerosene for reading or writing, the soft mellow gas light never injures my eyes, which are not so strong as they were when I was under the sixths. If I use kerosene, two hours is enough, I have to throw my book or pen away as my eyes begin to ache—not so with gas. As a shareholder, I say to the managers of the Gas Co., don't allow yourselves to be played out; the shareholders will back you up in

adding the Electric Light to your plant, whether you win or lose, citizens will have cheap light from competition; raise the money necessary on preference shares. I will take \$1,000 to help you along.

[P. S.—During the time the Gas Co. had the contract, the police were exceedingly vigilant. Notes were taken of every gas lamp that was blown out by the wind, or blown out by boys, and deductions were made at the end of the quarter. It is notorious that the Electric Lights are often out and very often extinguished before the hour in the morning prescribed by the contract. I am credibly informed that no deductions have been made.]

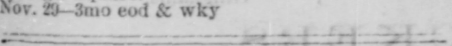
