SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Considering the President's Message.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27. The House Committee on Foreign Affairs attempted to meet to-day according to order, to consider the President's message on the fishery treaty. Six members responded to the call. As no quorum appeared no effort was made to transact any business, and the proceedings were confined to an informal discussion, which was mainly interesting from the fact that it revealed a strong disposition on the part of the three Democrats and three Republican members present to divide on party lines.

A Burglary Epidemic.

MONCTON, Aug. 27. General alarm has been caused by numerous burglaries in this vicinity, the last reported being that of Geo. E. Ford's store at Sackville, which was entered early Sunday morning and the safe blown open. Among the articles taken were several watches and revolvers, a draft on the National Hide and Leather Bank of Boston, in Geo. E. Ford's favor, for \$8875, two drafts in favor of W. W. Wright for \$6585 and \$360. Also some cash.

An Unpleasant Reception.

TORONTO, Aug. 27. E. S. Cox, ex-broker and Central Bank wrecker was brought here this afternoon by a detective. Over 3000 people had assembled on the wharf and hooted and jeered at Cox, and threatened to mob him and throw him into the bay. The police positively refused to admit him to bail. His arrest has caused great excitement here.

Another Defaulter.

HILLDAL, Mich., Aug. 27. Chas. W. Waldron, one of the owners and managers of the Waldron Bank, of this city, has absconded, taking money and securities variously estimated at from \$60,000 to \$80,000. The depositors will be paid in full.

Three More Arrests.

DUBLIN, Aug. 27. The police of Westford to-day arrested John Redmond, his brother William Redmond, and Edward Walsh, editor of the Westford People, charged with offences under the Crimes Act.

Yellow Jack.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Aug. 27. To-day there has prevailed most unfavorable weather, being warm with sunshine, and hot, yet only seven new cases of yellow fever have developed, within three deaths.

Minister Thompson Knighted.

OTTAWA, Aug. 28. Hon. J. S. D. Thompson, Minister of Justice, has been made a K. C. M. G., in recognition of his services in connection with the fisheries question.

Found in the Canal.

MONTREAL, Aug. 27. Joseph Archambault, architect, who had been missing since Thursday, was found in Lachine Canal to-night. He had considerable money with him.

A Substantial Present.

LONDON, Aug. 27. William J. Lane, Nationalist member of Parliament, has been presented with a purse of £880 by his constituents in East Cork.

Within Three Months.

OTTAWA, Aug. 27. An impression now prevails here that the Retaliation Bill of the United States is sure to be put into force within three months.

Rifle Matches.

TORONTO, Aug. 27. The annual matches of the Toronto Rifle Association opened here to-day. There are 260 entries, as against 250 last year.
