declarer would have had no trouble making four notrump. But West led the king of spades, and declarer wound up going down two. The extraordinary play—no other lead could defeat the contract—had a sound foundation. The purpose was to destroy the value of dummy's diamonds, and it succeeded admirably.

If declarer took the king, there would be no entry available to cash the diamonds, while if declarer ducked, a spade continuation would achieve the same effect.

East's play of the deuce of diamonds carried special significance. If East had held two diamonds, he would have been obliged to show them by commencing a high-low. This is a standard convention employed when dummy has a long, threatening suit. West was therefore justified in concluding East held three diamonds, and hence declared her two.

The next step in West's reasoning was to assume East had the queen of spades. Unlikely as this was, West could not very well grant this card to declarer because it would be a concession of defeat.

Therefore, since the contract could not be defeated unless East had the spade queen, West assumed this to be the case, and planned his defense accordingly. A low spade back would not have done the trick. By ducking in dummy South would have romped home with ten tricks.

**South Saskatchewan Dam Is Given All-Party Approval**

OTTAWA (CP)—The \$184,000,000 South Saskatchewan Dam project won unanimous all-party Commons approval Monday after strenuous Liberal resistance on procedural grounds.

Opposition Leader Pearson, obviously nettled by a government supporter's claim that the Liberals were "indirectly" opposing the plan, said his party objects only to the methods used in getting it through Parliament.

He said the fact that legislators were merely asked to ratify an agreement between the federal and Saskatchewan governments, instead of having a chance to debate the project clause by clause, "violates parliamentary rights and traditions."

Ratification of the agreement was finally given by unanimous vote of 129 to 0. The formal division was requested by the Progressive Conservatives.

**REVERSES STAND**

Mr. Pearson said his party supports the dam-and-irrigation project—a reversal of the stand taken by the former Liberal government—but feels that the parliamentary procedure adopted meant that the government was getting a "blank cheque."

Agriculture Minister Harkness denied Mr. Pearson's criticisms, saying the procedure had often been used in the past. But the former Liberal government usually provided only a figure in spending estimates.

Under current procedure, members would be allowed to debate the issue and ask questions under estimates to be included as work progressed.

Arguments on the dam project, which one speaker said has been under consideration off and on for 100 years, occupied morning and afternoon debate at a Labor Day sitting which saw a maximum attendance of 129 members. Occasionally, fewer than 75 of the 265-seat House were in the chamber.

On the vote the roll-call was 97 Conservatives, 27 Liberals and five CCF members.

**HISTORIC DAY**

CFP House Leader Hazen Argue said this was a "historic day" showing that if the people of a province are united and deterred they will "win through."

Referring to Armand Dumas (L-Villeuveuve) who gave reasons why the Liberals supported the agreement, Mr. Argue said Mr. Dumas had shown that where a regional project is of some national benefit, members from all parts of Canada generally approve.

The plan would "stabilize" feed growth over a 45,000-acre area and provide irrigation for 500,000.

**British Locate Cheaper Source Of Heavy Water**

LONDON (CP)—A British firm announced Friday it has developed a method of producing heavy water, used in some atomic reactors, more cheaply than any now available.

The process, developed by the engineering firm of John Brown Limited, may prove of considerable importance to Canada, whose research and long-range planning for nuclear stations has been mainly concentrated on reactors using heavy water, rather than graphite, as a moderating medium.

A John Brown spokesman said the new process will allow heavy water, the popular name for deuterium or heavy hydrogen, to be sold at a price "substantially lower" than the United States price of \$28 a pound. At present, the United States is the cheapest source of heavy water. The price of heavy water produced in Norway is about \$100 a pound.

**NO WORD ON PRICE**

The British firm gave no indication of the exact price it would be able to set for heavy water.

The new British technique is based on the principle that if ammonia is brought into equilibrium with a mixture of hydrogen and nitrogen, there is a differential concentration of heavy water between the ammonia and the hydrogen. This ammonia synthesis process has been known for some time, but the British firm said it has developed "a new route" which enables cost reductions.

JOHANNESBURG (Reuters)—Nearly 42,000 Africans have been moved from their former homes here since the start of the government's re-settlement scheme in February, 1955, C. Prinsloo, chief information officer of the department of native (African) affairs, said Monday.

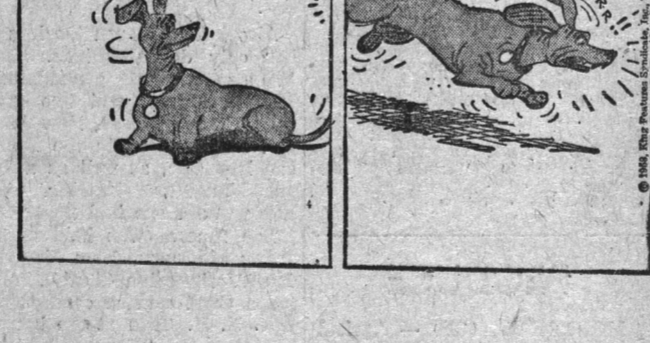

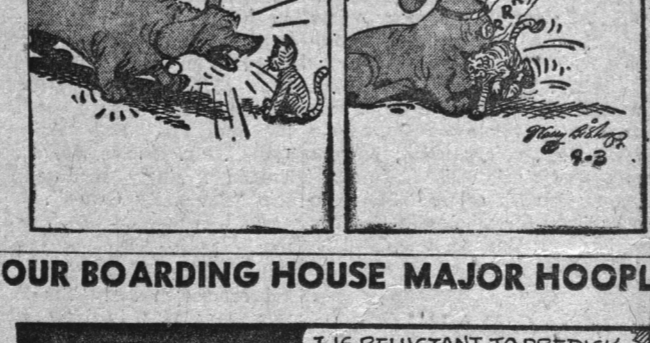

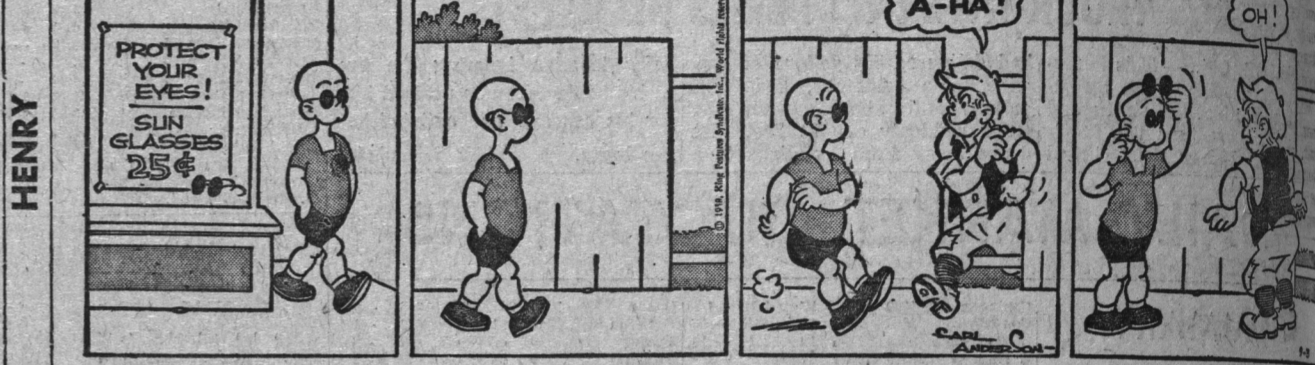
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
