

Power Cuts Power Rates Urban And Rural Areas

Lower consumer electric rates have been obtained in Summerside as a result of a special session of town council.

Within Summerside the domestic service energy charge has been changed from 18 cents per kilowatt hour for the first 200 kilowatt hours per month to 12 cents per kilowatt hour for the first 100 kilowatt hours per month. The total consumption of the town energy charge is 1.8 cents per kilowatt hour for the first 100 kilowatt hours per month.

Under the new rate, 400 kilowatt hours of electricity will cost home owners \$11.70 per month. Formerly the same amount would cost \$12.50 per month.

The town general service energy charge for light, heat and power, up to three kilowatts connected load, has been changed from 18 cents per kilowatt hour for the first 100 kilowatt hours per month to 12 cents per kilowatt hour for the first 100 kilowatt hours per month.

Fisheries Minister Leo Rossler said yesterday "the provincial government of Prince Edward Island has no objection to the fishing limit in Canadian waters as long as it does not harm our fishery markets with other countries."

He said there were reports from the federal government in Ottawa that he was opposed to a 12-mile limit. "This province," he said, "favors the 12-mile limit, but by no unilateral action is it going to harm our markets."

He is thinking particularly of the United States where he enjoys large lobster sales.
