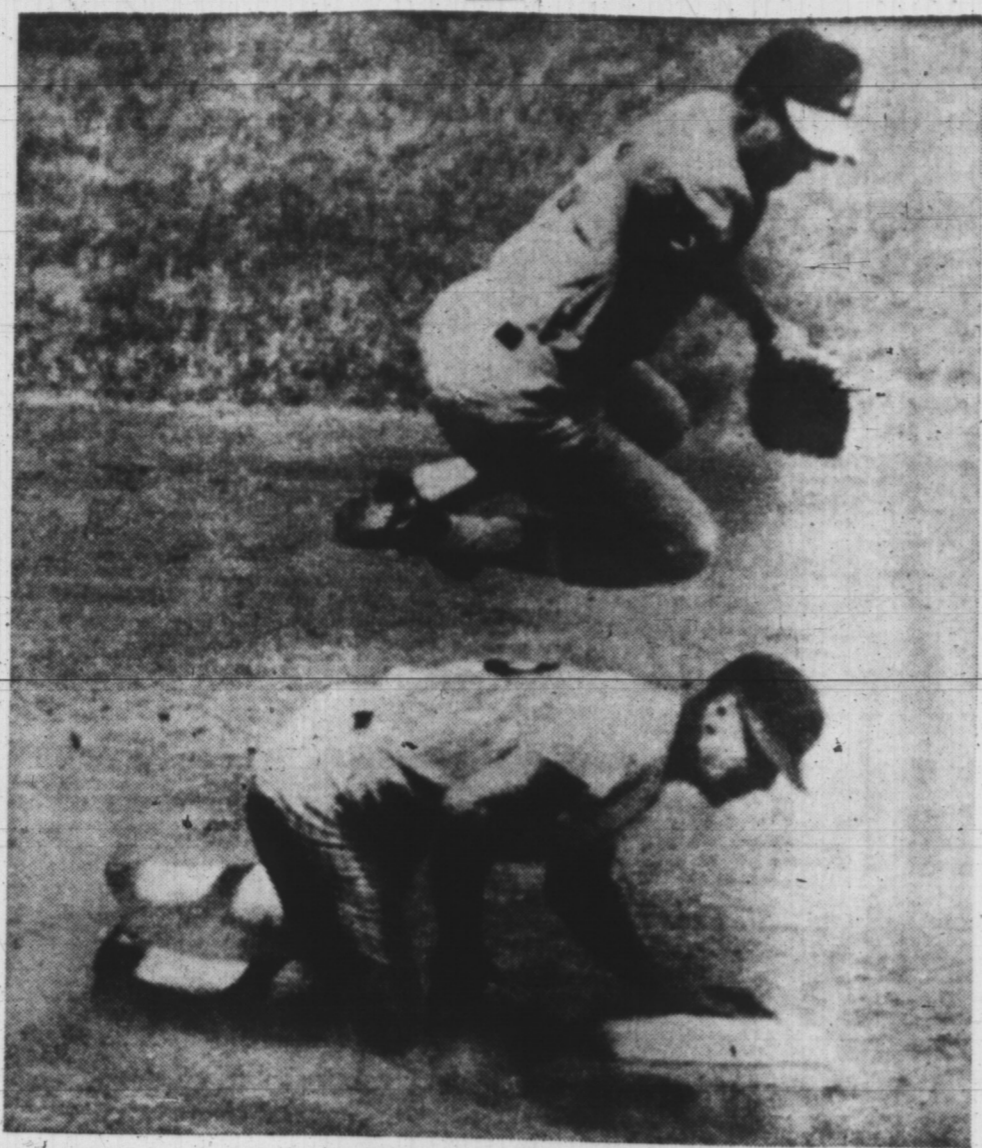
Ball Games Get Closer

Willie Mays Knocks Mark; Orioles Defeat Yankees

CHICAGO (AP)—Willie Mays pounded the 521st home run of his career to tie the Ted Williams record for third place on the all-time home run list Thursday and touched off a 6-4 victory by San Francisco Giants over Chicago Cubs.

Mays unloaded his 16th homer of the season off Dick Ellisworth in the first inning. Ozzie Virgil and Jim Davenport scored ahead of him.

Mays' next target is the career total of 534 by Jimmy Fox, which would make Willie the greatest right-handed home run hitter in major league history.

The all-time high is 714 by Babe Ruth.

The league-leading Giants swept the four-game series with the Cubs, but had to break out of a 4-4 deadlock in the eighth.

The Cubs had scored on John Boccabella's homer in the second inning and tied it 3-3 with a pair of runs in the fourth, including one by Ron Santo, who stretched his hitting streak through 21 games with a single.

Mays also collected two singles for his first three-hit game since the seventh game of the season. One of them came in the tie-breaking eighth and aided in the leading run.

NEW YORK (AP)—Brooks Robinson hit two home runs and Andy Etchebarren and Sam Bowens one each in leading Baltimore Orioles to a 5-2 victory over New York Yankees Thursday.

Both Yankee runs also came via homers with Joe Pepitone hitting his 12th in the fourth and Mickey Mantle his seventh in the eighth.

In addition to his homer Etchebarren drove home another run with a double in the second inning. Brooks Robinson led off the inning with his 14th homer and Paul Blair followed with a two-out double. At Downing, who lost the game for a 6-5 record, was pitching at the time.

Cleveland starter Luis Tiant allowed only one run on one hit for five innings, but needed help as the Red Sox erupted for three tallies in the sixth.

US Tennis Stars Remain In Race

LONDON (AP)—The U.S. trio of Dennis Ralston, Cliff Richey and Stan Smith—all that is left of a hopeful squad of 16 who started Monday—reached the last 16 Thursday of the Wimbledon men's singles on a day that saw yet another seed toppled and some scintillating pinpoint tennis from Manuel Santana of Spain, the reigning U.S. champion.

Fifth-ranked John Newcombe of Australia was the seed to fall and for the third time the giant-killer was an Australian. He was Ken Fletcher, 26, who was almost rolled off court for the first two sets and fought back to win 8-10, 4-6, 6-3, 6-4, 6-3.

Canadians Keith Carpenter of Montreal and Harry Fauquier of Toronto were victorious in the first round of the men's doubles. They defeated John Barrett and Peter Curtis of Britain 2-6, 6-4, 6-4, 7-5.

WINS BUT OFF FORM Ralston carried too much weight for South African Keith Diepraam and won 6-2, 4-6, 6-1, 6-1, but the U.S. No. 1 seed still hasn't found his best form and his control showed signs of coming apart under tension.

Canadian Football League To Have 44 Tilts Telecast

Winnipeg (CP)—Forty-four Canadian Football League games will be telecast by the two Canadian television networks—CTV and CBC—this season, exclusive of playoffs.

Officials of the two networks announced Wednesday that the television season begins Aug. 3, and concludes Oct. 30, the final day of the regular schedule.

Western viewers will see 31 games—24 originating in the West and seven in the East. Eastern fans will see 20 telecast games—13 from the East and seven from the West.

In all CTV games, centres at which games are being played will be blacked out. When games are being played in other centres on the same day as tele-

US Champ Casper Plans Masters Win

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Bill Casper, with two United States open golf crowns under his belt, is still hungry—but not for buffalo meat.

"I want to win the Masters," he said recently. "It's my one big remaining ambition in golf. I'll do it some day, you just wait and see."

Casper who has been playing in the Masters tournament since 1957, came closest last April. He finished just six strokes back of winner Jack Nicklaus.

Casper sank putts of 25 and 35 feet on the back nine Monday in winning the 18-hole playoff for the open title over Arnold Palmer by four strokes.

On Sunday, he had rallied from seven strokes back to overtake Palmer and tie for first place at 278.

WON IN 1959 Casper won his first open at Winged Foot in Mamaroneck, N.Y., in 1959, one-putting 31 of the 72 greens.

The 1966 Open probably will be remembered as the Open which Palmer blew rather than the one that Casper won. This is a fate Casper recognizes and accepts placidly.

"Palmer is a great golfer with a marvelous record," he says, "but he, Jack Nicklaus and Gary Player have been built into prominent personalities by the pros. Other players have been put into a gray area."

NEW YORK (AP)—Oscar Bonavena, the South American heavyweight champion from Argentina, upset favored George Chuvalo of Toronto, the Canadian champion, Thursday night on a 10-round split decision at Madison Square Garden.

The two judges voted for the South American but referee Arthur Mercante called it a draw, voting 4-4 with four points for each man. Judge Tony

Rossi saw it 7-3 for Bonavena and judge Tony Castellano had it for Bonavena 5-4. The AP card agreed with Mercante.
