Summerside UF Report Shows 65% Reached

SUMMERSIDE — This town has reached 65 per cent of its quota in the United Fund Appeal, it was reported at a meeting of campaign workers here by Summerside campaign chairman Thomas Richardson.

Mr. Richardson said it was anticipated that the Summerside appeal would reach its quota by Oct. 20, closing date for the campaign.

Attending the meeting were United Fund workers from Summerside, Athens, H. 123 School Region, Miscouche and Evangeline High School areas. Campaign goal for Prince Edward Island is \$338,483.

Minister Says All Complaints Handled By Milk Control Bd.

Complaints over alleged unfair competition by members of the P.E.I. Fluid Milk Association should be taken to the P.E.I. Milk Control Board, says Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae.

DICK BIRD, F.P.S.A.; A.R.P.S.; F.Z.S.

Mr. Bird for over forty-five years has travelled the globe, producing motion pictures. He has covered wars, revolutions, bandits, famines and many world news events.

He is now, with his wife, another naturalist cinematographer, engaged in producing wild life films. He has produced wild life sequences for the Walt Disney studios and other U.S. producers, and for the Canadian Government. In a recent public statement the Saskatchewan Minister of Natural Resources said: "No single individual has done more for the cause of Conservation in Canada, than Dick Bird." A recent editorial in his home city, Regina, spoke of him as a "prophet not without honour."

He is a Fellow of the Royal Zoological Society of London, and has received the rare honour for a Canadian of being made a Fellow of the Photographic Society of America.

ROBERT F. SHAW
Robert F. Shaw, Deputy Commissioner General of the Canadian Universal and International Exhibition, Montreal, 1967, is a Professional Engineer, builder, industrialist and Arctic authority.

Born in Montreal and educated at McGill, Mr. Shaw graduated in 1933 with a degree in Civil Engineering. In the depression one of the few jobs then available to a young engineer was as a labourer and foreman for The Foundation Company of Canada Limited. Twenty-nine years later, Mr. Shaw was appointed President and Director of this company.

From 1943 until the war's end, Mr. Shaw was shipyard manager at Pictou, Nova Scotia, and was then appointed Assistant to the President and Manager of Engineering. In 1951-52 he was loaned to Defence Construction Limited as Vice-President, Director and Chief Engineer. And in 1952 he was loaned to NATO where he reported on European military airfields.
