Woman Doctor Started With \$24

MONTREAL (CP) - Winnipeg-born Dr. Elizabeth Lautsch arrived in Quebec City 30 years ago with \$24 and a determination to become a doctor.

Now she is associate professor of pathology at Temple University, Philadelphia, and a specialist in neurophysiology and cardiovascular pathology.

Dr. Lautsch was in Montreal to deliver a paper to the seventh inter-American congress of cardiology being held here.

In an interview she said she reached the top "the hard way." Besides the \$24, she had a knowledge of French, English and German, when she embarked on her education.

"I made ends meet by giving language lessons - French to the English, English to the French and German to both."

She said her father gave her \$25 a month towards her school fees and his blessing as she was the youngest of six children and it was during the depression.

She graduated from Laval University with her medical degree in 1944 and returned to Winnipeg to start a private practice.

She returned to Laval three years later for postgraduate studies, and eventually was appointed lecturer.

She joined staff at Temple University in 1955. One of her duties is to do all pathologic reports on the heart and blood vessels in the university hospital.

She concentrated on the structure of the heart valves and their structural changes in the effects of rheumatic fever.

The findings of Doctors William S. Fitch, M.D., and Englebert D. Douglas McEachern Jr. will be presented at the annual meeting of the Medical Association meeting in San Francisco next week.

Dr. Lautsch said that the development and growth of cancer is a complex process involving many factors.
