S., a short time ago, in aid of a new church at that place. The proceeds were \$1,550. SCOTT ACT.—One new summons, first offence, returnable on Friday, was served on Saturday evening. An offender was put down to jail this afternoon. CURELIANA.—The first rink of this popular winter pastime was played in the Hillsborough Rink on Saturday evening. The ice was in good condition and the game very interesting. A tournament is talked of. WEEK OF PRAYER.—The first of the union meetings of the Week of Prayer will be held this evening in the Prince Street Methodist Church, at half-past seven o'clock. Speaker, Rev. J. M. McLeod. Collection in aid of P. E. I. Hospital. NEW STEAMER.—We understand that stock in the steamer to replace the M. A. Starr next year, is being rapidly taken up in Halifax. Mr. W. W. Clarke will, we are informed, have the stock list open for intending shareholders in this city in a few days. THE MARSHALSHIP.—The names of several well-known citizens are mentioned in connection with the appointment of a successor to Marshal Passmore. The general impression, however, appears to be that Sergeant Cameron should be appointed to the position. SMOKER'S TABLE.—Mr. John Strain has a very pretty smoker's table on exhibition in Reddin's drug store. Beside the table is a flask of beans, and the person guessing the nearest to the number of beans in the flask takes the table. The charge for a guess is only ten cents. PUGILISTIC.—Joe Lannon wants a purse of \$1,000 to fight Godfrey 15 rounds, winner to take all the money. AFFAIRS AT BONNE BAY.—A Sackville N. B. despatch says that the Rev. Mr. Darby whose name was mentioned in a recent cablegram as having written to the Pall Mall Gazette concerning the difficulties between the French and English fishermen in Bonne Bay, Newfoundland, is at present a student at Mt. Allison. He says that the letter was written five months ago, and that repeated efforts have been made by magistrates, ministers and private persons to get the matter before the English public through the columns of the Times and other journals, but that no attention has been paid to these appeals by any papers with the single exception of the Pall Mall Gazette. According to Mr. Darby, the state of affairs in Bonne Bay must speedily result disastrously, unless some careful, yet decisive action is taken to settle these difficulties. KING'S COUNTY FARMERS.—Farmers in the eastern part of the Island are just now enjoying special advantages. The harbors west are closed, while those east of Georgetown, Souris, &c., are as free of ice as in midsummer. Potatoes are still in good demand at these ports, at 20 cents per bushel, and also oats at 32 to 34 cents. The privilege of being able to ship so late in the season, gives the eastern farmers better prices than they would otherwise obtain, if their harbors were to freeze up so early as do those west. The only way to equalize prices of farm products all over the Island and to make it possible to reach the foreign market at all seasons of the year, is to build the Subway. The Chignecto Ship Railway is to be built? Why not build the Subway which is of far more importance?

They Can Be Seized.

OTTAWA, Jan. 6. The treasury authorities in Washington, in reply to the request of a Detroit Customs officer for instructions, says empty railroad cars introduced into the States from Canada and used for domestic traffic can be seized.

Again Appealing.

TORONTO, Jan. 6. The movement in France to secure the opening of British ports to French cattle is causing agricultural papers to renew their appeals to the British Government to cease the present exemption to Canada.
