New Gadget Being Adapted For Locating Forest Fires

OTTAWA (CP)—An electronic gadget that steers guided missiles to their targets is being adapted to give forest rangers a weapon that should detect forest fires at birth.

The device will get its first test early in June at the federal government's big forest research station near Pembroke, Ont.

It involves an airborne scanner capable of sensing and plotting different degrees of temperature.

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'Just Moving Says Accused; Verdict-Guilty Of Possession

SUMMERSIDE — James W. Taylor, of Calgary, Alta., was found guilty as charged after Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald heard the evidence of Police Chief Vernon Reeves of Kensington in Prince County last night.

Taylor, who had earlier pleaded not guilty to the charge of illegal possession of liquor in a place other than his residence, called to the stand to testify, his wife Blanche who corroborated the evidence given earlier by himself, which said that he was in the process of moving from one home to another and that he was simply moving the nine cases of alcohol.

He was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days in jail. R. MacMahon acted for the crown.

Edward Claire Hynes, charged with failing to stop on the signal of a peace officer, had his case adjourned to June 15th.

Magistrate MacDonald found the accused that he had better come up with his lawyer's fees for running away from the officer and where he spent the evening night or he was liable "to spend some time downstairs", obviously referring to the jail.

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They Sees New Route For Power To U.S.A.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—A system of over land and under-water cables through Labrador, Quebec and the Province of Ontario can deliver power from Labrador to New England "very cheaply" says a Quebec Premier Spinald says.

Mr. Smallwood, speaking in the legislature here, said his government has been making inquiries into the practicability of bringing electric power from Labrador's Strait of Belle Isle to Newfoundland and from Port aux Basques, Nfld., Cape Breton by submarine and over land cables.

He said he was "aware of the mill rates" suggested as a price for which power, if it went through Quebec, could be sold to Consolidated Edison Company of New York at the Canadian-U.S. border near Montreal.

I am able to say that, according to preliminary reports I have received, power can be delivered from Labrador to New England, through Newfoundland, at a selling price very competitive with the price at which it would be delivered at the point near Montreal."

PERSONAL ON THE AIRCRAFT
The device will be installed in a pod under the wing of a Beaver aircraft. Ground crew will set up the test fires, using smokeless charcoal in small barbecue burners.

Chrysler To Buy Mack Trucks Inc.

NEW YORK (AP) — A proposal by Chrysler Corp. to acquire Mack Trucks Inc. was approved Tuesday by directors of both companies.

The acquisition agreement, announced May 1, Chrysler would issue up to \$154,500,000 in convertible subordinated debentures to buy Mack. The proposal is subject to approval by Mack shareholders and holders of Mack funded debt.

With the acquisition, Mack would be a division of Chrysler, retaining its present brand and distributor network. Mack makes trucks, buses and fire-fighting equipment.
