

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

**LONDON, Aug. 15.**  
A Belgrade despatch says that numbers of Russian troops in Bulgaria are deserting to join the Bosnians.  
The Austrians have occupied Lioni in North-western Herzegovina.

**LONDON, Aug. 15.**  
A despatch from Bucharest says that the Russians occupied Varna, Bulgaria, on the 11th, with a garrison of 10,000 men and one hundred guns.

Sir Stafford Northcote, Chancellor of the Exchequer, replying to an enquiry in the Commons, said that no communications had been exchanged with the Vatican regarding the establishment of diplomatic relations between Great Britain and the Holy See.

It is stated in well informed circles that Admiral Hornby has been ordered by telegraph that as soon as the embarkation of the Russian Imperial Guard is completed he shall withdraw his section of the British fleet from Princess Island in the Sea of Marmora to Gallipoli, but not retire to the Mediterranean until the remainder of the Russian troops have retired west of Chatalja and the Turks are securely in possession of those works. He will then leave a sufficient number of ships at Gallipoli and Gulf of Saros to maintain the invincibility of the peninsula until the Russians are beyond Adrianople or across the Balkans.

**LONDON, Aug. 15.**  
Advices via Constantinople say that Gen. Szapary's division of the Austrian army of occupation was defeated near Tzla on the 11th of August after a brilliant battle which lasted twelve hours.

**BERLIN, Aug. 15.**  
Fritzsche, a Socialist, has been elected on a second ballot to the German Parliament from the fourth district of Berlin by a majority of 2,000.

**ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 15.**  
The *Agence Russe* says: Statements in regard to the Russian Expedition to Central Asia relate to occurrences belonging to the time when England was preparing for war with Russia. Orders for Russian preparations have since been countermanded.

**NEW YORK, Aug. 15.**  
A telegram to the Mayor of Wilmington, N. C., yesterday, was as follows:—  
**GRANADA, Aug. 14.**  
To the Mayor of Wilmington, N. C.

Help us to pay nurses and bury the dead. Our town is a graveyard. We need help. The Mayor is dying and I am the only official left.

**MEMPHIS, Aug. 15.**

The Board of Health reported three deaths and seventeen new cases of yellow fever yesterday.

**NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 15.**  
There were 130 cases reported here yesterday.

**NEW YORK, Aug. 15.**  
The yellow fever scourge at the South appears to be spreading with alarming rapidity.

A special from Granada, Miss., reports fifteen new cases and five deaths and that not one hundred and fifty white people are left in the city.

**BOSTON, Aug. 15.**  
In the professional single scull race at Silver Lake to-day, three miles with a turn, purse \$400, Frenchy Johnson, colored, of Boston, won in 21:29, beating Riley a length and a half. Ellis Ward was third. Courtney retired at a mile and three-quarters, Johnson and Riley both leading him.

**HALIFAX, Aug. 15.**  
In the scull race to-day for the championship of the Harbor, the belt was taken by Warren Smith.

A despatch from Saratoga, dated Aug. 13, says:—James E. Riley, the noted oarsman, has accepted the challenge of Warren Smith, of Halifax, to row any man in the United States, but Courtney and Hanlan, for \$1000 a side. Riley agrees to row the race at Bedford Basin, Halifax, on September 3rd.
