New Telephone Directory Is Reported More Durable

Walter C. Auld, manager of the Island Telephone Company, said yesterday, the 1964 telephone directory, the delivery of which began earlier this week, will be more durable.

The cover of the new directory has been treated with a special plastic coating to ensure a maximum amount of durability he said.

Some 24,000 customers of Island Telephone began receiving the new book Wednesday. Directories in larger areas, such as Charlottetown and Summerside will be made by taxi, while rural customers will receive their copies through the mail. It will take two weeks to complete delivery. MV Registration Reported Higher

With the deadline for the registration of motor vehicles being March 31, registrar J.A. Gallant, yesterday reported that registrations in the province to date are higher than they were at this time a year ago.

Mr. Gallant attributed the higher registration to the mailing out of licenses this year, a departure from the normal procedure of previous years.

In addition to the Charlottetown office there are branch offices of the department at Summerside, Alberton, Montserrat and St. John's.

A breakdown in the registration of motor vehicles last year showed as follows: cars 28,207; trucks 7,462; farm tractors 4,206; and motorcycles 173.

The number of operator driver licenses issued was 3,143, and chauffeur licenses 2,916.

Suspended Sentences Out For Car Theft, Is Warning

Two-year suspended sentences were given Donald Pinesau and Joseph Leo Allan, both of North Ruston, by Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. in Queen's County magistrates' court yesterday.

The two accused had been charged with unlawfully taking a motor vehicle from the main street at North Ruston without the consent of the owner.

In passing sentence, Magistrate Johnston said that there had been so many similar cases before the courts during the past months that in the future the option of a suspended sentence or bail would not be allowed and those convicted would receive a jail sentence.

Since he doubts that they had made himself clear on the issue before this particular offence he allowed a suspended sentence for Pinesau and Allan but stressed that from here on in suspended sentences would not be allowed for similar charges.

The youths were warned to keep the peace and be of good behaviour and were remanded to Queen's County Jail to March 20 to allow for raising up of the two \$500 bonds.

Bill Passage Delays Budget

Until final and final reading has been given in the Legislature to a bill authorizing changes in methods of taxation of property for the purpose of business occupancy, no budget is expected to be prepared or presented to the City Council.

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Liquor Act Amendment Is Given Last Reading

A bill amending the Liquor Control Act providing for the licensing of certain establishments in the province to buy and sell liquor was given third reading in the Legislature yesterday despite opposition objection.

On a recorded vote on the motion that the bill be given third reading the 12 Conservatives that were in the House at the time voted in favor, while six Liberals voted against and two Liberals who did not rise on either vote, were recorded among the ayes.

Voting against the motion were Opposition Leader A.W. Matheson, Stewart Ross (4th Queens), Arthur MacDonald (1st Kings), Frank Jardine (4th Prince), George Mackay (4th Prince), and Robert Campbell (1st Prince).

Liberals recorded as voting aye were Donald MacDonald (1st Kings) and George Ferguson (5th Kings).

The amendment means that the government will have power to issue dining room, club, milk bars, taverns and license licenses for the sale of liquor.
