Nursing Fees Revised in N.B.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Sept. 25 — (CP) — A new scale of fees for private duty nursing was adopted today at the annual meeting of the New Brunswick Association of Registered Nurses.

Starting Nov. 1, the fees will be \$8 for an eight-hour day, \$12 for a 24-hour day and \$15 for a 20-hour day, the longest period of duty authorized. The present scale is \$6 for eight hours, \$9 for 12 hours and \$10 for 20 hours.
