EDINBURGH, (CP)—Roy H. Thomson, publisher of the Thomson Daily in Canada, announced Wednesday he has bought controlling interest in three Edinburgh papers—the Scotsman, the Weekly Scotsman and the Evening Scotsman.

To Live In Edinburgh

Thomson said he plans to take up residence in Edinburgh and spend part of each year there actively directing his newspapers. "I am very proud to be associated with the national newspaper of Scotland," he said. The Scotsman is nicknamed popularly "the Times of the North."

4 Million Youths And Athletes To Protect Voting

By DON DOANE BONN, (AP)—West Germany mobilized a civilian army of 4,000,000 youths and athletes Wednesday to protect Sunday's critical election. Then officials reported thousands of Communist terrorists were swarming across the border from Soviet-occupied East Germany.

Growing Invasion

The officials said the total of arrested Red toughs swelled to more than 7,000, with 2,000 arrests in the last 24 hours. But still the Communists came in a growing invasion which authorities feared might engulf West Germany's political force.

Thousands of Communists were reported coming in boldly by train, carrying forged travel permits, while uncounted hundreds of others slipped across the 600-mile frontier in remote forest areas which police could not possibly patrol.

Agents Confess

Three captured agents confessed that some assassinations were plotted against West German political leaders on Moscow's black list, the interior ministry reported. Officials declined to give further details of the alleged murder plot.

Two big organizations of youths and athletes—the Federal Youth League Bundesjugendring and the German Sport Association Deutsches Sportbund—volunteered to help combat this Communist challenge. Together, these organizations have about 4,000,000 members.

Water Shortage

Water lines began to drop alarmingly in reservoirs, creeks and holes used by farmers as parts of the heat-belt edged into the third week without measurable rainfall. Over-taxed water lines broke down in some big cities, inconveniencing millions of residents.

No Sanctuary

Dulles said the Communists could not count on "privileged sanctuary" in Manchuria if they renewed aggression against South Korea. The United States would not sit idly by as a peace conference with the Communists.

Australia Sells Butter To Russia

MELBOURNE, (Reuters)—The Australian dairy produce board will sell 2,000 tons of Australian butter to Russia at a price considerably higher than that which British pays for Australian butter, John McEwen, minister for agriculture, announced Wednesday.

7 Forest Fires Out of Control In Ontario

TORONTO, (CP)—More than 100 forest fires, seven of them uncontrolled, roared in Northern Ontario's parched timberlands Wednesday. From Manitoba to Quebec, 1,200 miles east, the fire hazard ranged from high to extreme under a blazing sun.

Successful Exhibition At Alberton Yesterday

Alberton Prince County Exhibition was favored with delightful weather yesterday. While the attendance of visitors was somewhat less than in recent years, the number of exhibits in many classes was larger than for some years. CHICAGO, (AP)—The scorching eastern half of the United States panted into the 12th day of a heat wave Wednesday and only limited relief was predicted for parts of the swelter-belt.

Insurance Man Dies Playing Golf

ST. ANDREWS, N. B. (CP)—George F. Crum, 57, manager of the Toronto agency of the Crown Life Insurance Company of Canada, died of a heart attack while playing golf here Tuesday.

Famous Corregidor Defender Dies

KARACHI, (CP)—A house in Karachi, birthplace of Mohammed Ali Jinnah, who is considered the "father of Pakistan," has been declared a protected monument by the government. The house is being converted into a national memorial.
