## Final Pathetic Paragraph To Burned Light

BALTIMORE, (AP)—Louis Nezb had added a pathetic paragraph to the story of a burned-out traffic light.

The light is at the intersection of Milton, avenue and Orleans street, which carries heavy through traffic across Baltimore's east side.

One red signal burned out around midnight on March 17, 1951.

At 1:30 a.m. a big tractor-trailer truck breezed into the intersection, no light against it. A car with the green, shot in from the left. They hit the big truck careened into the building on the corner where Louis Nezb ran a little plumbing supply shop and lived upstairs with his wife, Otta.

The Nezbz were thrown from their bed. Louis almost was killed. His wife was hurt. The place caught fire. The shop and the house were a wreck. Nezb's hair turned white overnight.

He spent all his savings on medical bills and repairing the building. There wasn't enough left to get the business going again.

The Nezbz sued the trucker and a jury awarded them \$21,000 in damages.

But the Maryland court of appeals at Annapolis said the accident was not the truck driver's fault. The burned-out light was to blame—the city responsibility. But the city cannot be sued for damages when something goes wrong in the exercise of its police powers.

There was no way the Nezbz could recover.

Everyone was sorry for them and a public subscription campaign raised \$5,000.

The Nezbz bought another house and tried to make a new start. But Louis was 71. He still had aches and pains from his injuries. He brooded.

Late Thursday he hanged himself.

## Famine Reported In Haiti Area

KINGSTON, Jamaica (Reuters) Between 40,000 and 70,000 persons are starving and hundreds are dying daily in Jeremie, southwest Haiti, which was devastated last October by hurricane Hazel, it was reported here Saturday.

Jamaica is rushing help to the republic and today voted \$1,000 to buy cod liver oil, vitamin B complex and other high-concentrated food.

The people are reported to be eating grass, roots, mules, donkeys and horses. After last year's hurricane had left crops battered, Jeremie's food position was aggravated by torrential rains in May and June.

Information on Jeremie's plight reached here via the colonial office in London after the British ambassador in Haiti had submitted a list of requirements from the Haiti government.

## Japanese Premier Making Recovery

KARUIZAWA, Japan, (AP)—Japan's 72-year-old Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoyama is showing remarkable recovery from the paralysis of his left side, his doctor announced Saturday. Prof. Sadataska Tasaka credited the improvement to spinal "electrifying therapy."

## ONTARIO BOOSTS TRADE

HAMBURG, Germany (Reuters) The province of Ontario will try to increase its trade with West Germany. A representative of the province's office in London will visit West Germany in mid-September to hold talks with German firms interested in trading with Canada. It was announced here Saturday.

## MARKETS

### New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market here went through its fourth week of reaction.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was down 60 cents on the week and closed at \$171.30.

It was early in July that the average hit \$177.00 signalled a record peak in market prices. Right after that the present reaction started. For the last two weeks it has been a slow motion affair.

Coppers were strong during the week in anticipation of a price increase for the metal. When the increase came—to 40 cents from 36 cents a pound—most coppers sold off on the news. Neither the higher swing nor the lower dip was violent.

Du Pont fell sharply at the start of the week under the weight of disappointed selling that followed declaration of a dividend of \$1.50 as compared with \$1.25 in previous quarters. Traders evidently had expected something better.

There was one indication of basic market strength when railroads rallied briskly. That raised the hopes of the bulls who pointed out that the rails many times before have provided the inspiration for a substantial forward movement with a quick rally.

The five most active issues on the New York stock exchange were Rhodesian Selection Trust up 1/4 at 6 1/2 on 127,000 shares, American Telephone up 2 at 181 1/2, ACF Brill up 3/4 at 15, Curtiss Wright up 2 1/2 at 22 1/2 and Foremost Dairies 26 after making its initial trade as a newly listed stock at 24.

Canadian issues were mixed. International Nickel gained 4 1/2 on the week, closing Friday at 81 1/2. Hiram Walker added 2 1/2 at 76 and Distillers Seagram was up 1/4 at 40 1/2. Dome Mines dropped 1/4 to 15 1/4. Canadian Pacific was off 1/4 at 33 1/2 and McIntyre, unquoted at last week's close, stood at 85, down one point from Aug. 5.

Giant Yellowknife added 1-16 to 6 1/2 on the American Stock exchange. Lake Shore was off 1/4 at 5 1/2 and Royalite Oil dropped 1/4 to 13 1/4.

The United States sold 93,000,000 bushels of wheat for export under special programs in the last year.

### U. S. Steel

CLEVELAND (AP)—With a rise in steel production this week for the first time in a month, the immediate outlook is for the best operations since June. Steel the metalworking weekly reported Sunday.

After climbing to 97 per cent of rated capacity at the end of June, steel operations dropped nearly 27 per cent during the steel-workers' wage negotiations.

Recovery from this slump was slowed by summer vacations, extremely hot weather that affected both equipment and workers and equipment repairs. However, conditions are about over, chance for reasonable weather are improving and progress is being made in repairing equipment, the magazine says.

Production this week was up one point to 91 per cent of rated capacity. Resumption of steelmaking in the Birmingham area, where a railroad strike had tied up production, was a big factor in the rise.

STEEL 34 CENTS

Steel says some consumers are building steel inventories but are not reducing their rate of order. The automobile industry took 3.9 per cent of mill shipments of finished steel compared with 18.9 per cent last year, the trade magazine reported.

The construction industry, while in a boom, took only 11.4 per cent of mill shipments in the first half of this year compared with 14.2 per cent last year.

Steel's price composite on steel-making scrap edged down to \$43.83 a gross ton this week, a drop of 34 cents. The price composite on finished steel remained unchanged at \$127.41 a net ton.

### NEW SOVIET INSTITUTE

LONDON (AP)—The Soviet Academy of Sciences has set up a "special institute of Economy of Modern Capitalism." Moscow radio said Saturday. The broadcast said that at a meeting of the academy in Moscow Friday the Institute of Economics was "subjected to criticism for failing to study systematically the works of foreign progressive scholars of economics."

# Coffee Price Slump Hits Canada's Trade With Brazil

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's exports to Brazil, her biggest Latin-American market, have dropped to a five-year low and there is no improvement in sight.

Though Canada's over-all exports have risen by about 10 per cent in the first six months of 1955, the rise by no means reflects buoyancy in all parts of the world.

In the six months, shipments to Brazil plunged to \$6,500,000 from \$30,000,000 in the similar 1951 period—the lowest exports to that important Latin outlet since the \$4,700,000 in the first half of 1950, G. F. Osbaldeston, Canada's vice-consul and assistant trade commissioner at Sao Paulo, says.

Many factors contributed to the drop, such as greater competition from Japanese and European exporters and an increase in Brazil's industrialization.

DOLLAR SHORTAGE

But by far the biggest cause was Brazil's dollar shortage, traced directly to a drop in her coffee sales to the United States and other countries.

Brazil's dollar receipts from all exports averaged about \$65,000,000 a month in 1952 and 1953. By mid-1954 this had dropped to an average of \$30,000,000 a month and the situation did not improve during the first half of 1955," says Mr. Osbaldeston, writing in the government's foreign trade magazine.

HEAT HITS EUROPE

LONDON (Reuters)—A heat wave hit Britain and continental Europe Saturday, with temperatures of 81 degrees being recorded here. Hottest spot on the continent was Italy, where the thermometer soared into the 90's at central and southern resorts.

Next in honors was Bordeaux and the seaside resort town of Biarritz, on the west coast of France, where holidayers swarmed to the beaches to escape an 88-degree stizzle.

ANCIENT POWER

Ancient Egyptians and Romans fitted war galleys with hand-operated paddle wheels.

Brazil's local currency is called a cruzeiro and her defence against the dollar shortage includes auctioning off available foreign exchange. Imports are classified in five categories in accordance with degrees of essentiality. Dollars are more readily available for the more essential goods but the exchange cost of dollars tends to be high.

## PRICED OUT OF MARKET

"Many products are priced out of the market," says Mr. Osbaldeston, "not because of their high cost but because of their landed cruzeiro cost."

To help overcome this exchange problem, many firms from Europe, U. S. and Japan have set up plants in Brazil to retain markets which otherwise might have vanished.

"This is a possibility that might profitably be examined by more Canadian firms," advises Mr. Osbaldeston, though he adds: "However, undertaking a branch plant is not without its difficulties."

"Brazil is not an easy market to sell in," he says, "but it is Canada's seventh largest and our largest in South America. It deserves to be watched closely."
