

## Election Victory Predicted At Joint P.C. Ass'n. Meeting

The prediction of a conservative victory in the next provincial election and the importance of maintaining and increasing organizational activities for this purpose was stressed at the annual meeting of Provincial Conservative Third and Fifth Districts held jointly last evening in Summerside, with presidents George Riley and Henry Wedge as co-chairmen.

The several speakers who addressed the meeting in addition to the chairmen, included Dr. Orville H. Phillips, M.P. for Prince County; Dr. Hubert McNeill, president of East Liberal Association; Mrs. Evelyn Liddon, president of the provincial Women's Association; Dr. L.G. Dewar, M.L.A. for the Second District of Prince; Frank Myers, M.L.A. for the First District of Queens; Bennett Carr, provincial president of the Y.P.C.; and Donald MacDougall, vice president for Prince of the Y.P.C.

The meeting elected district officers for the next year as follows:

Fifth District: president, George Key, Jr.; vice-president, Martin DesRoche; secretary, George McMahon; executive officers, Desmond Gaudet, Harold Linkletter, and Clifford Rankin.

Third District: president George Riley, (re-elected); vice-president Timon B. Gallant; secretary, Ray Farrell; executive officers, Keith Harrington and Cyrus P. Gallant.

The special speaker, Dr. Orville H. Phillips, M.P., dealt with a number of matters of special provincial interest including agriculture, fisheries, employment, hospitalization, dominion-provincial relations, and various federal projects which have been of material benefits to Prince County.

In a resolution expressing confidence in Dr. Phillips, and appreciation of his efforts on behalf of Prince County, it was noted that the meeting had extended to all districts in the county including

suitable for the purpose, lacked sufficient space and proper facilities, the site was unsuitable because it was located too far from Borden, and in a wooded area rather than near a coast or harbour in accordance with its architectural design.

This resolution was also critical because no tenders for its construction were called, and because it was constructed by the contractor at a negotiated price, which is understood to be in the vicinity of \$12,000, and whereas a building of similar architectural design and size was available from the crown assets disposal corporation for a nominal sum which would have resulted in a substantial saving to this province, he it resolved that this meeting request a proper explanation for this waste of public funds.

Noting that electricity is becoming more and more essential to farmers, a resolution on this matter said that the districts of St. Gilbert, Enmore, Margate and numerous other areas have had requests submitted for this service for a number of years, and the meeting asked for immediate steps to see that these areas be serviced with electricity.

The provincial government was also asked to correct a situation existing in the Third District of Prince, where, during the past year, the district has had only one assemblyman in the provincial legislature who is resident in the province.

RESOLVE LOYALTY  
A resolution of loyalty and support was also tendered to the provincial leader, Walter Shaw.

In other resolutions the convention went on record as noting that the federal members were able to obtain a grant of \$1 1/2 million per year for the next five years under the federal government "Road to Resources Development Program", and demanded that the provincial government spend a large sum or share of this money in Prince County to compensate for its lack of Trans-Canada Highway, and the heretofore ignored development of the tourist industry in this county.

The federal government, in another resolution, requested to speed up its investigation into the feasibility of a causeway between New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

Noting that winter unemployment has always been a very serious problem in this province, and that the federal government has made funds available to pay half the labor cost on work involving capital expenditure, the convention urged the provincial government and municipalities to find ways and means to take full advantage of the federal aid.

The meeting condemned the "discrimination" of Premier Matheson "in his failure to give greater cabinet representation to Prince County".

The new tourist bureau at Albany was also the subject of a resolution which observed that this type of building was not

The paved highways in the entire third district does not exceed 15 miles, according to a resolution which felt that this district is one of the most prominent farming and fishing areas in the province, and the provincial government was asked to take note of the urgent necessity to provide more paved roads in this area.

The failure of the provincial government to announce even a tentative date for the operation of the hospitalization program was criticized by the convention which "deplored the delay and endless excuses formulated by the provincial government in relation to this plan".

Stating that some of the better fishing centres of the province are located in Prince County, in such places as Malpeque, Egmont Bay, and Alberton, and that cold storage facilities were inadequate to meet the

needs, the convention noted that the Acadian Fisherman's Co-Op, along with others, has applied to the provincial government over two years ago for a grant to aid in providing these facilities, and had been refused all requests for grants for this purpose, reconsideration of the matter was requested by the convention.

The unfavorable effect on the economy of this province from the 17 per cent increase in freight rates was expressed by the meeting which strongly protested the increase and shared the resentment expressed by the eight other provinces who are now appealing the decision to the federal cabinet.

In a final resolution the convention endorsed the findings of the convention on education which was held in Charlottetown on the weekend of November 8th.

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FLAKY CROISSANTS

1. Scald 1 cup milk. Stir in 1 tsp. salt. 1 1/2 tbsps. granulated sugar. Cool to lukewarm.

2. Measure into large bowl 1/2 cup lukewarm water. Stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar. Sprinkle with contents of 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins. THEN stir well. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, 2 cups once-sifted all-purpose flour and beat until smooth and elastic. Work in an additional 1 1/2 cups (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour.

3. Turn out on floured board; knead until elastic. Roll out dough into a 12 x 20" rectangle; spread with 1 cup firm butter. Fold 1/3 of dough

crosswise over centre third; fold other third over top, making 3 layers. With open end toward you, roll and fold again. Wrap; refrigerate overnight. Next day, repeat rolling and folding steps twice; wrap and chill 1/2 hr.

4. Roll into a 12 x 20" rectangle; cut into 15-4" squares. Cut in half diagonally; roll up each triangle from long edge; roll on paper-covered cookie sheets. Curve rolls to form crescents. Brush with mixture of 1 egg yolk and 2 tbsps. milk. Cover. Let rise until double in bulk—about 3/4 hr. Bake in hot oven, 425° about 12 mins. Yield—2 1/2 doz.

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
