MR. BLOWITZ OPINION.

Figaro Thinks France Will Stand out for Equivalent.

PARIS, Oct. 26.—M. de Blowitz, the Paris correspondent of the London Times in a letter on the Fashoda situation to the Matin explains the intensity of the English feeling in the matter of reconquering the Soudan as based upon their thirst to avenge Gordon. "Major Marchand's presence in the midst of their exultation," he says, "is like a cut with a horsewhip. England does not aim to mortify Marchand, but she resents an oblique blow aimed at a campaign which has been openly conducted. France is ready to march at the drum-call, but I am convinced that the call will not sound. What is Fashoda to France, compared with its value to England? In case of war we should be fighting to keep Marchand in Fashoda when in truth he has already departed."

The Figaro declares that there is not a single statesman worthy of the name in Europe who believes of the possibility of a conflict between England and France. "When England finds an equivalent for Fashoda," the paper adds, "the trouble will no longer exist."

The Lobster Commission.

LUNenburg, October 26.—The fishermen who appeared before the lobster commissioners here agree that the size limit should be abolished and all lobsters should be caught, excepting of course, seed lobsters. They all stated that the present, law relating to size was not carried out and might as well be abolished. They contended that if the size limit were abolished the law prohibiting the catching of the seed lobster would be generally observed. Many suggested the idea of issuing licenses to lobster fishermen on Mr Baker's plan, swearing them to observe the law respecting seed lobsters. A proposal to increase the size limit to 10 1/2 inches was unanimously opposed. It was agreed that this would entirely end the lobster business in this county at least, as less than 10 per cent of the lobsters caught were of 10 1/2 inches. There was a diversity of opinion as to the close season. The open season of the opinion that the open season should commence April 1st, instead of January 1st, and end June 15th. Two lobster packers were present, and in every respect concurred in the views of the fishermen. Any size limit law for exportation was disapproved of.

MENELEK ON THE WARPATH

Ostensibly His Purpose is to Punish a Rebellious Chieftain, but His Sincerity is Doubted.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—King Menelek is on the war path with 40,000 warriors and several batteries of artillery. His objects ostensibly is to chastise the rebellion, chief, Ras Mangascia, but the remainder of the Abyssinian army is being rapidly mobilized, which is scarcely necessary for the purpose of crushing a mutiny. A good deal of anxiety prevails in Rome and Massowah, and the frontiers of the Italian colony of Eritrea are being hastily reinforced. Captain Cola, who was sent to King Meneleka's court to negotiate a settlement of several small matters has been kept cooling his heels at Addisababa for six months, and his mission is certainly a failure. The fact is that King Menelek has been told by Frenchmen and others that Italy only desires a pretext to abandon Eritrea altogether and it is quite possible that he has decided to afford that pretext by continually worrying Italians.

The European Governments take considerable interest in the matter because it is pretty well known that if Italy withdraws from Massowah, Russia will seize that port and hold it against all comers including Abyssinia.

NEWS NOTES.

It is stated that \$4,000 more are required to make up the Acadia College fund.

Considerable alarm is felt by reason of the renewed activity of Vesuvius. On Friday night for some time the volcano emitted immense volumes of dense smoke, accompanied by intermittent series of reports audible for miles. The glare from the interior of the crater lighted the sky brilliantly.

The Siecle, of Paris, after urging peace, remarks: "France would hardly come off better in a war with England than did Spain in the war with the United States. France will be better employed in developing her colonies than in thwarting England." The Autorite of France declares that France ought never to have gone to Fashoda, adding: "It was a stupid mistake and now England calls on us to get out. Well, it is no use talking, we shall have to get out, otherwise there will be war which would be madness."

Monreal Gazette: Mr. Wm. Redmond, M.P., has been declaring to a Dublin meeting that Ireland's sympathies are with France and calling for cheers from Marchand. The fact that he is allowed to do this kind of thing, it is the best evidence that could be sought of the liberality of the Government. Mr. Redmond dislikes it. It indicates also something of the contempt in which the same Government holds Mr. Redmond's influence. The British Government is the only one in the world that lets politicians openly roar sedition.
