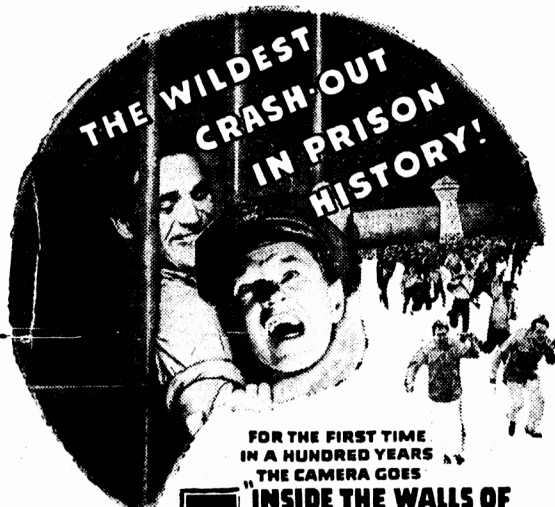

Former Minister Of Caledonia Church Dies

TORONTO, Oct. 15 — (CP) — Rev. Laughlin Beaton, 85, retired Presbyterian minister who preached in both English and Gaelic, died today.

Born in Bourdarie, Cape Breton, N.S., he learned Gaelic from his Scottish parents. He was educated at Dalhousie University, Halifax; Auburn Theological Seminary, Auburn, N.Y., and Montreal Theological Seminary.

He was ordained in Montreal in 1886 and retired in 1906. His pastorates included Cape North, N.S., Moose Creek, Ont., Caledonia, P.E.I., Grand River, N.S., Marsboro, Que., and Scotstown, Que. He also had pastoral charges in Blackville, N.B., Riverfield, Que., and Havelock, Ont.

He leaves a daughter, Mrs. Murray Spaulding of Toronto, and two sons, Dr. John Beaton of Blackville, N.B., and Wing Cmr. Edward Beaton, R.C.A.F., Montreal, N.B.
