U. S. Withdraws From Japan

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the withdrawal of the last American division from Japan now is under way.

The U.S. defence department announced Thursday the departure from Japan of the 1st Cavalry Division. This was one of the first major units to arrive of the original army of occupation nearly

23 years ago and is the last to leave.

Departure of the 1st Cavalry will leave in Japan several air force wings, the 3rd Marine Air Wing and a handful of army troops who will act as housekeepers and care-

takers. The total number of American servicemen remaining in Japan will be about 17,000.
