Thousands of tourists who call in at the bureau during July and August will see the display which features, for the most part, scenes painted in the picturesque Island countryside.

Other artists will also contribute to the exhibition during the season. The P. E. I. Bureau Receiving Many Inquiries

Enquiries for literature about Prince Edward Island's vacation attractions fell off during June as the first arrivals of the summer started their holidays in various parts of the Province. However, the number of enquiries held up with that of June of last year.

A total of 1,347 persons wrote the P. E. I. Travel Bureau during June seeking information about the Province. This compared with 1,299 in June 1951. Information was sought by 738 Americans and 415 Canadians. Letters were also received from persons in foreign countries which asked for information about Prince Edward Island.

Authorizes Civic Debenture Issue

At a meeting of the City Council held yesterday morning, presided over by Acting Mayor Elmer MacDonald, the Finance Committee was authorized to issue refunding debentures to the amount of sixty-eight thousand dollars, dated July 3rd. The debentures are to be for a term of twenty years, and to bear interest at the rate of four and one-half per cent per annum, payable half yearly, in denominations of one hundred dollars or in any larger amount. City debentures to the total amount of \$136,000 have all been retired, and the Council has statutory authority to re-issue refunding debentures to the amount of one-half of the debentures so retired. The retired debentures were permanent works, maturity July 1, 1951, \$30,000; City Hall annex maturity July 2, 1951, \$20,000; Fire Department, July 2, 1951, \$15,500; school, Dec. 15, 1951, \$500; and permanent works July 2, 1952, \$70,000. A resolution was passed authorizing the City Clerk to trade in the engine of the grey Mercury truck and have the same replaced by a new engine. It was also agreed to that a 250 c.p.t. light be placed on Belmont Street near the conjunction with Kensington Road. In addition to acting Mayor MacDonald, Councillors Storey, Gormley, MacCormack, Farmer and Johnstone were in attendance.

The death in Duluth, Minnesota, of William Cutcliffe removed from that city one of its better known political workers for good government. Continued from page 1 highest in 30 years' records. This is associated with the appearance of warm-water species.

Mr. Rasmussen whose report was one of several outlining completed research and detailing 1952 marine study programs, said that "the change of climate... has had the effect that several marine forms, previously with a more southern distribution, have extended their habitat into Greenland waters. Simultaneously the more Arctic species have retreated farther north."
