STRATFORD ON AVON, England (AP) — They just won't let poor old William Shakespeare rest in peace. Now a student of the bard says he never married Anne Hathaway.

"Shakespeare married Anne Wheatley," Lady Beecham said here. "The records show it. Anne Hathaway married William Wilton—and the records show that too."

Lady Beecham, first wife of the late conductor, Sir Thomas Beecham, has lived for many years at Clopton House near this home town of Shakespeare.

Told of Lady Beecham's theory, Levi Fox, a Shakespearean expert, reported: "I am quite satisfied with the accepted interpretation of Shakespeare's marriage to Anne Hathaway."

Fox is keeper of the city's records and director of the Shakespeare birthday trust.

Love Checkmates Chess Champion

HASTINGS, England (Reuters)—Love checkmated American woman chess champion Lisa Lane here.

Miss Lane withdrew from the Hastings International Chess Congress, explaining she could not concentrate on her play in the tournament because she was "homesick and in love."

Miss Lane, 24, a native Philadelphian now living in New York, told a reporter "I resigned because I found I could not concentrate. My thoughts keep wandering when I should have been thinking what my opponents would do."

"I felt homesick and besides that I am in love. I am not engaged. I am just in love."

Miss Lane had defaulted in four of her five games. The only one completed, a draw, was against British woman champion Eileen Tranter.

Miss Lane declined to identify the object of her affections. "I would rather not say who he is. It might cause embarrassment." Asked if he played chess, she replied "I would rather not say."

She had a date to be received this morning by the mayor of Hastings at the town hall. She said she intended to start her journey home shortly after that.

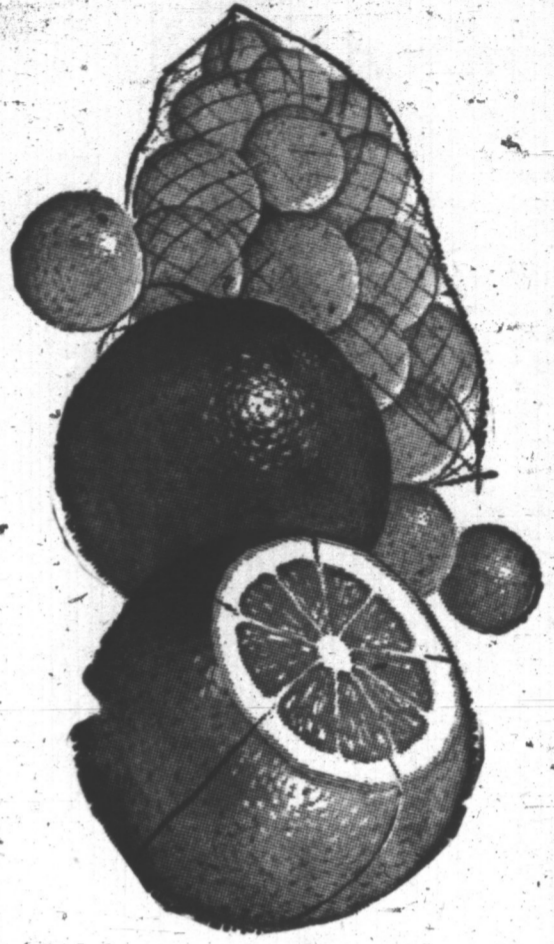
