DOMINION PARLIAMENT. A SHORT RECORD.

The Course of Legislation. Proof of Dissensions in Grit Ranks. A GRIT WHIP'S ADMISSION.

Disappointment in Opposition Circles. OTTAWA, May 6.

In the Senate yesterday there was an interesting discussion upon the expediency of establishing a Divorce Court for Canada.

In the Commons yesterday, numerous petitions for labor legislation bills were introduced, also a Sunday Observance bill and a bill amending the Elections and Franchise act; also a bill prohibiting foreign labor. None of them will probably pass.

In reply to a question Sir John Thompson stated that the Government had decided to pay the costs of deciding in the courts the constitutionality of several acts passed by the Provincial Legislatures, including the Manitoba School Act.

The Criminal Law and Codification Bill will be introduced on Monday. Replies from the Provincial law officers being unfavorable to the abolition of grand juries, the bill will not deal with that subject.

Both Houses will adjourn this evening until Monday next.

The sudden termination of the debate on the address in answer to the speech from the Throne, indicates that there are serious dissensions in the Opposition ranks, as it is well-known that there was a determination to move an amendment and so test the Government's strength.

The chief Opposition whip, Trow, last evening estimated the Opposition strength at ninety-two. This estimate allows the Government a majority of thirty-one. The first vote will probably show that the majority is larger. There is much disappointment in grit circles. "Better things were expected" expresses the feeling of the Opposition.

The Prohibition Movement. OTTAWA, May 6.

The legislative committee of the Dominion Temperance Alliance decided yesterday to introduce into the House of Commons this session the following resolution: "That the time has arrived for the prohibition of the manufacture, sale and importation of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes."

Death of an Archbishop. LONDON, May 6.

Archbishop Magee, of York, died yesterday of influenza, aged 70. He was enthroned Archbishop on last St. Patrick's day. Three members of his family are now prostrate with the same disease.

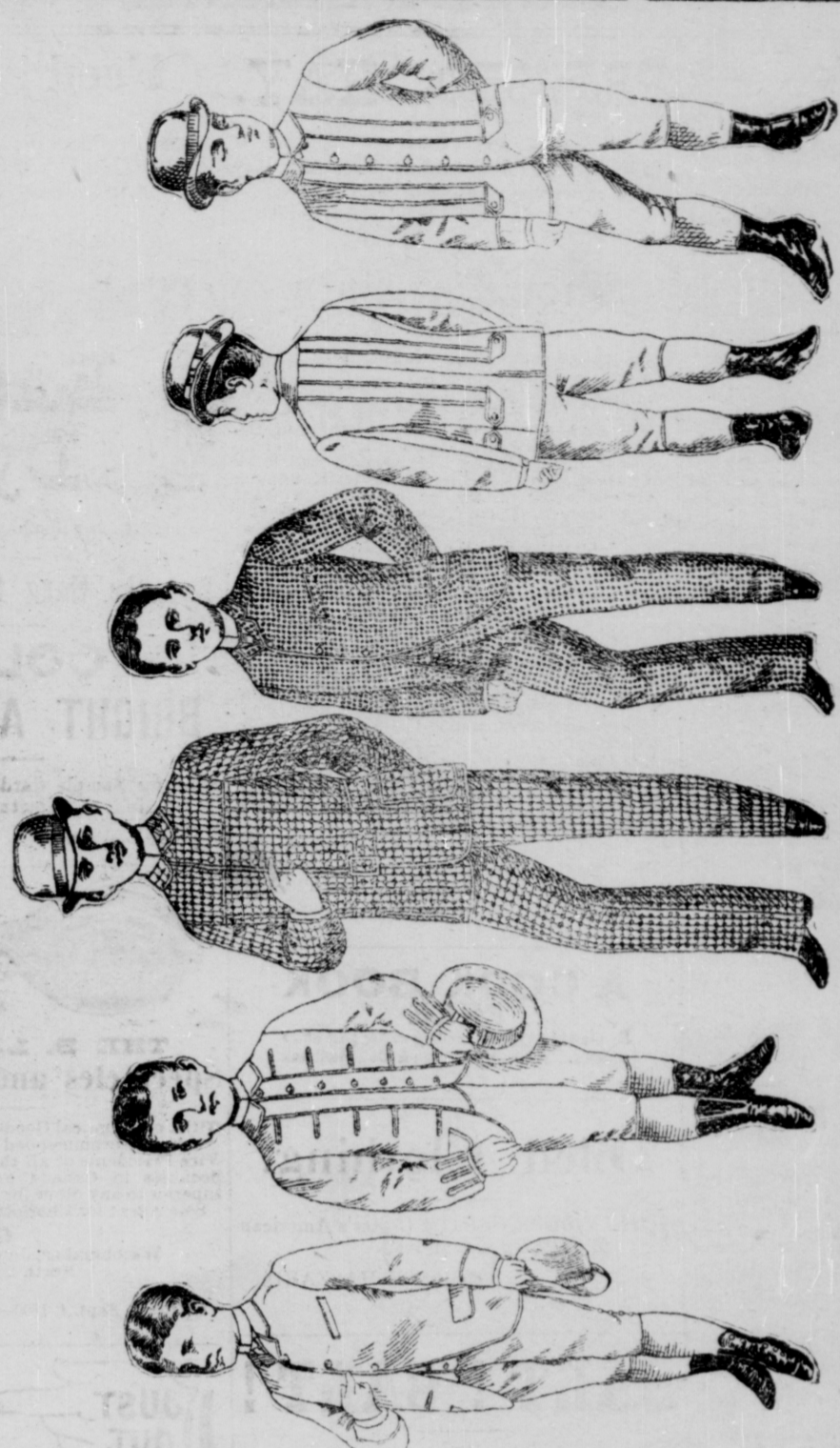
