Mr. Sangster said later meetings will be held to "make final decisions" on studies relative to resource development, rural and urban improvements and fisheries.

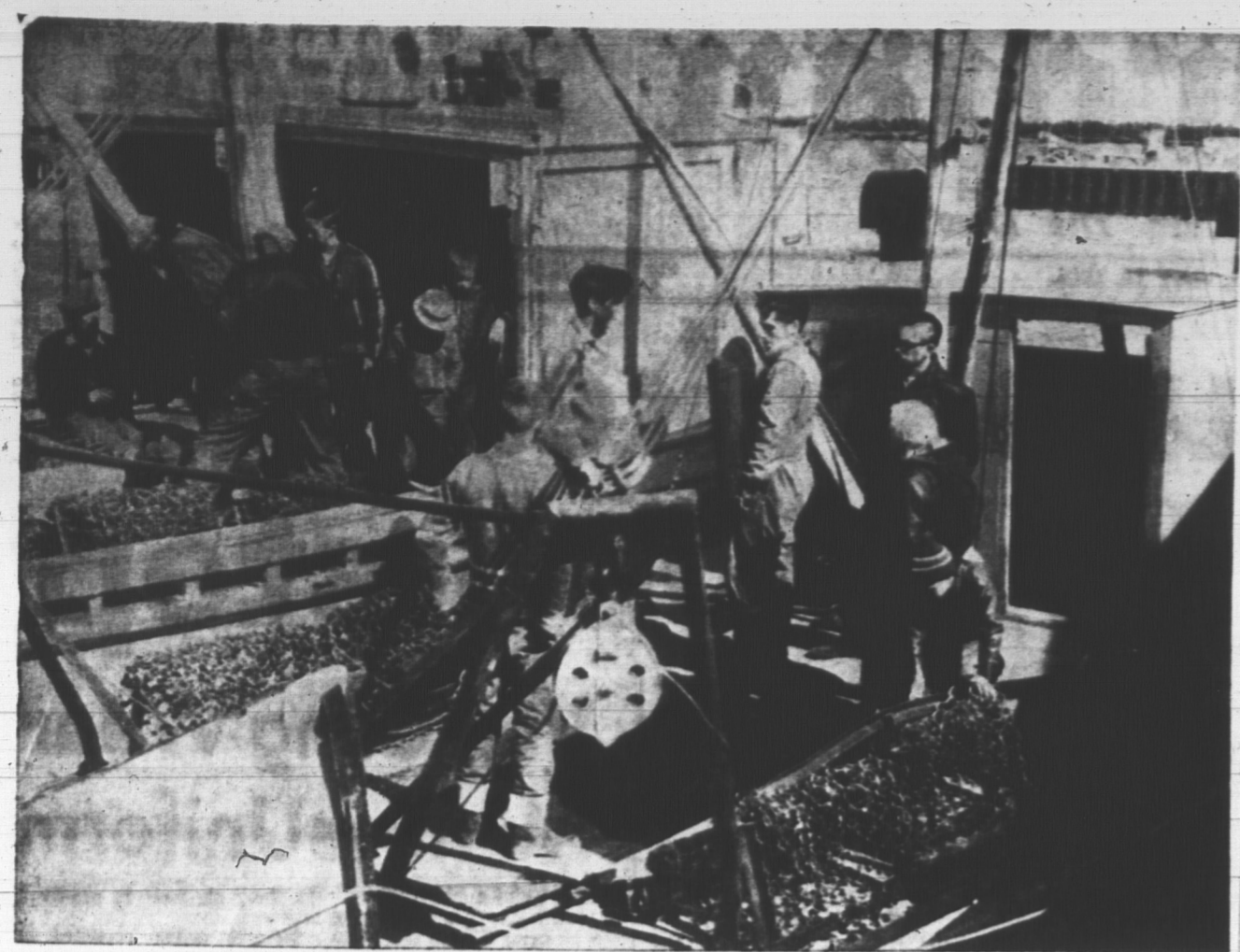
Provincial Development Policy Aired

LOADED SCALLOP BOATS CAUSE FLURRY AT ALBERTON

The arrival of two draggers with about 1,000 pounds of scallops each caused a flurry of activity at Alberton south last evening. The "Gail Marie" captained by Ralph Fraser and the "Sharon Lloyd", skippered by his son, Dale, both of Alberton-South, are carrying out a search on the north side for scallop beds of sufficient size and capacity for commercial fishing. A large part of the catch was quickly sold for local consumption and the remainder was sold to Summerside firm. The "Gail Marie" is owned by Roy and Upton Fraser of Alberton-South. Both boats dragged for scallops off Miminegash last summer.

Anglican School Teachers' Training Workshop Planned

SUMMERSIDE — The first in a series of training workshops for Sunday school teachers and youth leaders from Anglican parishes in the western end of Prince Edward Island will be held at St. Mary's Hall, Summerside, Sunday, May 16.

The program is in connection with the introduction in September of a new Christian education curriculum in Anglican parishes across Canada.

The workshop will begin with an afternoon session which will consider the purposes of Christian education. Following a two-hour break for supper (out of town people will be permitted to bring a box lunch and use kitchen facilities in the hall), Evensong will be sung at 7 p.m. Preacher will be Rev. E.J. Fiander, rector of Kensington. Lay persons (including one woman) will read the lessons, and an anthem will be sung by the St. Mary's girls auxiliary.

The program will conclude with discussion in groups and a role-played consultation on the subject of "problems of discipline".

The Anglican curriculum is learner-centred, rather than content-centred. As a result there will be less emphasis on memorization of texts and catechisms, and reading or telling of stories to children. Group discussion and the relating of Bible and prayer book resources to the life and experience of children will be emphasized.

Samples of new curriculum materials will be available at the workshop for examination. They will not be used until 1966 in Sunday schools which operate only in summer-time, but teachers in these schools, like those in others, will need training in the new methods if they are to use the new material. It was stated.

26 Registered Holsteins Sold At N.S. Auction

Fifteen buyers purchased 26 head of registered Holstein cattle for an average price of \$422.50 at Truro, N.S., on Saturday, May 14. Mr. Jarvis, Maritime Holstein fieldman.

The top price at the "Fifth Annual Holstein sale of the East" was the \$750 paid by Waddy and Colpitts, Salisbury, N.S., for a "large, lovely heifer" whose three nearest dams had an average breed class average production of 122 milk, 127 butterfat. Mr. Jarvis reports.

Four senior calves averaged \$290 each. The average price received for 22 bred heifers was \$452. There were 14 head that sold for \$400 or more.

Waddy and Colpitts were the largest buyers and they paid \$3,015 for six head.

Leonard Chase, Berwick, N.S., paid \$1,390 for three animals.

It was the best sale of the five held thus far, Mr. Jarvis enthused.

The sale committee consisted of Gordon Dickie, Archie MacMillan and H.W. Roper, all of the Truro area, and Mr. Jarvis.
