THE DEVIL MAKES THREE OPENS TODAY AT CAPITOL SUMMERSIDE

—Gene Kelly hangs up his dancing shoes for a straight dramatic role in M-G-M's exciting picture, "The Devil Makes Three," now at the Capitol Theatre. And co-starring with him is Pier Angeli, hailed as Hollywood's most sensational acting find of the past decade. Kelly comes to his new role from his outstanding hits in "Singin' in the Rain" and the Academy Award-winning "An American in Paris." It marks his first non-musical assignment since "Black Hand" and his episode in "It's a Big Country." —The Freetown Royals hockey team completed a wonderful record during the past season by once again winning the South Shore League Championship in the Bedouque rink and the Simmonds and MacFarlane Trophy. This marked the eighth consecutive year that the Royals won the Championship.

Five players competed with all eight championship teams. The five are Walter Campbell, Walter Simmons, Albert Waugh, Robert MacMurdo and Prowse Gardiner.

For the past two years the Royals also competed in the North Shore League and both times they won the League Championship. Along with the league championship they captured the R. S. Humphrey Trophy.

And the Royals won still more honors. Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture donated the C. C. Baker Trophy in 1950 for annual competition and the Royals have had possession of the Trophy since it was donated. The trophy is awarded to the champion team of the North and South Hockey Leagues each year.
