Toronto Stocks

TORONTO (CP)—The stock market recorded a fourth straight session of gains Thursday and touched a record high along the way.

The industrial index climbed three-quarters of a point to record 386.06, but backed down to end at 385.52 for a fractional gain. The previous high was 385.93, last Jan. 3. The next day prices here followed the New York market down for the sharpest break in 4 1/2 years after the mid-1940s federal reserve board increased margin requirements on stock-buying to 60 from 50 per cent.

Papers, steels, liquors, refining oils and financial institutions gained Thursday but utilities, construction and manufacturers eased. Equitable Life climbed \$3 to \$43. General Motors \$2 to \$95, Vickers \$1.25 to \$44.25 and Consolidated Paper \$1.75 to \$64.75.

Calgary and Edmonton led western oils with a 75-cent advance. Brokers said they could see no market development Thursday that reflected any reaction to the opening of the Senate banking committee's study of the stock market in Washington.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced 20 cents, its fourth straight rise, and closed at \$162.20. Its third straight high. Volume was 3,300,000 shares. Graham-Paige again topped the active list Thursday up 1-8 at 3-8. It was followed by Tetrax up 5-8 at 15-78 and Boeing up 1-4 at 96-12.

Canadian issues closed mixed. McIntyre was up 3-4 and Dome Mines gained 1-4. Canadian Pacific International Nickel and Hillman Walker were all off 1-8 and Distillers Seagram slipped 1-4. Lake Shore dropped 1-8 on the American stock exchange and Giant Yellowknife was off 1-4. Royalite Oil was up 1-8.

French Reds Seek To Explain \$80,000 Villa

PARIS (AP)—French Communists who have criticized the purchase of an \$80,000 villa near Cannes for ailing party boss Maurice Thorez were told Thursday they should regard it as an investment of working-class funds.

"If some of its members are lodged in villas or pavilions bought by the party that does not involve personal privileges but collective decisions for the investment of working-class funds," said a communiqué concerning the deal that has aroused a storm among some Red militants.

One of them in obedience to a party decision that comrade Maurice Thorez agreed to live in a southern villa bought on the advice of the central committee. The villa is the property of Communist workers who may be sent there for needed rest.

The luxurious villa stands in a private park and has seven bedrooms, three bathrooms, four reception rooms and several outbuildings.

Ottawa May Co-operate In N. B. Power Plan

OTTAWA (CP)—The question of federal co-operation in New Brunswick's Beechwood dam project is receiving consideration, Labor Minister Gregg said Thursday.

However, he told the Commons, the federal government does not propose to make a financial grant towards the cost of the development on the St. John river.

A. J. Brooks (PC—Royal) asked the minister about the correctness of a Frontier Gleaner headline dealing with a recent local radio speech by Mr. Gregg. The headline read: "Gregg says Ottawa can't aid Beechwood."

Mr. Gregg said the federal government has been helping with technical assistance in other ways. The whole matter of co-operation was receiving federal consideration. He had stated in the broadcast the federal government could not make a grant.

After Cleanup Life Not Worth Two Cents

MONTREAL (CP)—City councillor Nat Aronoff, a supporter of Mayor Jean Drapeau's campaign to clean up city politics and police organization, says his life isn't worth two cents as a result of the anti-corruption drive.

Usually a voluble member of the Civic Action League, which captured key positions in last November's municipal election, he said in an interview Wednesday: "If I had an interview I'd get out of the country for about three months."

A reporter reminded Aronoff no city councillor was ever killed for reform activities. "I don't exaggerate, my life isn't worth two cents," Aronoff said.

"Has your life been threatened," he was asked. "Yes," he answered.

Councillor Aronoff represents Montreal's district No. 5. He has figured prominently in a post-election shake-up of Montreal politics.

India's Communists Take Sharp Defeat At Polls

KURNOLL, India (Reuters)—India's Communist party suffered a shattering defeat Wednesday in its first major attempt to take over a state legislature at the polls.

Latest returns from the first election held in the state of Andhra in southeast India assured a sweeping triumph for Prime Minister Nehru's Congress party.

Nehru's party, joined for election purposes with Congress elector groups, has so far won 58 of the 196 seats in the state assembly—mostly in direct fights with Communist candidates.

The Communists so far have won only two seats and their leaders openly confessed their estimates have "gone wrong."

The election, first held since Andhra became a state Oct. 1,

1953 was staggered over five days ending last Sunday. Counting began Tuesday and final results will be known next Tuesday.

Controls Relaxed

WASHINGTON (Reuters)—The commerce department relaxed controls Thursday on United States exports of an additional 25 commodities to North Korea. They included leather and woven industrial belts and belting, inedible animal greases and fats, rough and milled rice, oleochemicals, rubber mats, certain commercial refrigerators, hand, windmill, and service station pumps, nonballistic balls and flakes in small packages, and such hardware as iron and steel nails, bolts, nuts and screws.

SEEK TAX REMOVAL

MONTREAL (CP)—La Chambre de Commerce de Montreal sent a brief to Prime Minister St. Laurent Thursday urging abolition of the eight-per-cent federal sales tax on goods used in the manufacture of other goods. It also recommended tax exemptions in cases where the goods are bought directly from the manufacturer.

Fishing Brings Sizeable Income To Alta. Fishermen

WINTER SEASON

Most of the commercial fishing is done in the winter months when fishermen set their nets through holes in the ice. The provincial government sets a poundage limit for each lake suitable for commercial fishing.

Lesser Slave Lake, the largest lake in the province, has a quota of 1,500,000 pounds of tullibee. Fishing in this lake is done on a year-round basis.

Chicago and New York are the two principal export markets. These two markets absorb about 90 per cent of the export trade. Eighty-five per cent of the fish exported are whitefish.

Permanent packing plants, operating for about six months each year, operate on Lesser Slave lake. Most of the other lakes have temporary establishments where fish is cleaned, packed and iced for shipment.

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
