PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE,
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.
OFFICIAL SUMMARY.

THURSDAY, April 5.
Mr. J. R. McLEAN asked what objection could there be to inserting a clause providing for the examination being conducted in the district.
It was moved that the whole clause be struck out, which amendment was lost on division, and clause agreed to.
Up on the second clause being read as to the power of the Superintendent to enforce the attendance of witnesses,—
Mr. J. R. McLEAN said that the Superintendent might summon parties from all parts, and render them liable to criminal prosecution if they did not attend. More evidence might be secured if made imperative that enquiry be conducted in the District.
Mr. SINCLAIR repeated that enquiry should take place in the District, and that the whole Bill would damage the Education Act.

Mr. PROWSE enquired of last Speaker if he knew of any case where the Superintendent has not held enquiry in a suitable place. This is intended to afford greater conveniences and to save expense to the people.
Mr. PERRY remarked the Government were very ready to ask the Opposition for information but not willing to afford much themselves. What necessity is there for passing this Act? Have there been any complaints or petitions asking for this Bill? The member for Egmont Bay had complained when in opposition that the Act contained no provision for French education for the Acadians, and the present leader of the Government had introduced long resolutions on the subject. The member for Murray Harbor seemed also to have changed his opinion on the School Act. If an amendment were introduced providing for the proper examination of Acadian teachers it would have his cordial support. But men of yesterday were not the men of to-day. The member for Egmont Bay had made this question his platform when in opposition, and said he would join no party that would not enact such a measure. This Bill would be of no benefit. The Government must not be surprised at the Opposition speaking, for they have very little opportunity to speak to a Government measure this session.

Mr. ARSENAULT said that he and his constituents understood one another, and that was more than the member for Tignish could say; for he had been defeated time and again. All books French schools require are now in the schools.
Mr. FARQUHARSON said that when the Education Act was being passed, the present leader of the Government, and the member for Egmont Bay had opposed it. He quoted from the speech of the former where he said he could notice no improvement. Amendments required in 1878 are still urgently needed.
A motion was made to strike out the clause which was lost on division, and the clause adopted.
On the reading of the third clause, as to the right of appeal,—
Mr. PERRY said this was the most iniquitous clause ever attempted to be introduced to deprive of appeal. The Leader of the Government had changed his mind. He had stated that people should have a right to appeal to the County Court against unjust assessment. The Commissioner of Public Works had also said he was opposed to the supplementary clause; but he had changed his mind, for he had nine superior schools in his District.

Mr. SULLIVAN said the member for Tignish was not a partisan to accuse any member of inconsistency; he was a most remarkable example. When the Education Act was under consideration in 1877, some members thought there should be appeal from the County Court. The members from Port Hill and Southport voted it down. The County Court is an inferior Court, presided over by a single Judge. This is a different matter,—an appeal from a Board of eleven members. There is no appeal now from the Board—great reason why there should be none. The law confers great powers upon the Board, a sort of legislative power. Wherever litigation commences, the benefit of Education is gone. If the Board have the power to settle disputes, it will be very beneficial.
SPEAKER took the chair, Committee reported progress, and received leave to sit again.
Mr. PROWSE reported from Private Bills Committee, an Act to incorporate the Summerside Presbyterian Church, that a fee of \$14 be charged. Report adopted and Bill ordered to be read a second time tomorrow.
House adjourned till 3 p. m., Friday.

SATURDAY April 7.
Mr. SPEAKER took the Chair at noon.
The Bill to incorporate the Eldon Public Hall Company, was read a second time, and committed to a committee of the whole House, and reported agreed to, ordered to be engrossed, and read a third time on Monday.
The Bill to further amend certain Acts relating to the Town of Summerside, was read a second time and committed to a committee of the whole House.
Mr. SINCLAIR enquired what the extension of the powers contemplated were.
Dr. GILLIS replied, to enable recovery of taxes, that the working of the Act had not been harmonious, and that this Act was proposed merely the defects.
Mr. SINCLAIR considered it great pity that Acts were not brought forward in another manner. Enact a new Act, containing all amendments.
Mr. J. R. McLEAN said it would be a great improvement if Acts were consolidated.

Mr. BENTLEY said that he and his constituents understood one another, and that was more than the member for Tignish could say; for he had been defeated time and again. All books French schools require are now in the schools.
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House adjourned till 3 p. m., Friday.

MONDAY, April 9.
Mr. SPEAKER took the chair at 8 30 p.m.
Mr. MARTIN moved the third reading of the Bill to incorporate the Eldon Hall Co. Motion carried. The Bill was read a third time and passed.
Dr. GILLIS moved the third reading of the Bill entitled "An Act to further amend certain Acts relating to the town of Summerside." Motion carried. The Bill was read a third time and passed.
Mr. HAIN asked the Commissioner of

advisable. The expense would be too much for a small Act.
Mr. SPEAKER took the Chair, and the Bill was reported from Committee, with amendments, on motion for a third reading.
Mr. MARTIN took objection, that amendments were becoming too numerous, and trusted there would be a law to consolidate the Acts.
The Bill was ordered to be read a third on Monday.

Mr. BEER asked for papers to be laid on the table, connected with the case of Holman vs. Green, before Supreme Court of Canada.
Mr. SULLIVAN said they would be laid on the table.
Mr. FERGUSON laid on the table returns from Public Lands Department, showing the number of acres unsold on each Township.
Statement Cash Receipts at Public Lands Department during months of December, 1882, January, February and March, 1883. Statement showing Receipts issued from April 1, 1882, to April 1, 1883.

Mr. FERGUSON said labor involved in preparing statement of Receipts for December 1882 had been very great, and he did not know for what objects.
Mr. FARQUHARSON said December Receipts had been very heavy and he wished to know who the parties were.
Mr. SULLIVAN introduced a Bill to further amend the Act rendering written memoranda necessary to validity of certain promises and engagements which was read a first time and ordered to be read a second time on Monday.

Mr. BENTLEY asked the Commissioner of Public Works what action is proposed to be taken on the new road asked for from Scarlott Road to Wright's Mills.
Mr. CAMPBELL replied none. There were two different parties asking for two different routes. If they agree action will be taken.
On motion that House go into Committee of the whole to consider expediency of introducing a Bill to amend the Act to commute the Crown Revenue etc.,—
Mr. SULLIVAN said when Responsible Government was granted in 1857, it placed at the disposal of the Government mines, minerals, etc.,—whether we have any or not, explorations should be made, and this Act was intended to grant licensing privileges to private parties; also in event of a mine being discovered, parties discovering shall pay bounty to Government. House went into Committee.

Mr. BEER was glad to see a Bill of this kind. It might prove an encouragement to parties to explore.
Mr. J. R. McLEAN considered encouragement should be given to parties searching.
Committee reported resolution, which was referred by House to Special Committee, to bring in Bill in accordance therewith, which was accordingly done, and the Bill read a first time and ordered to be read a second time on Monday next.
The Act in further amendment of the City of Charlottetown, Incorporation Act was read a third time and passed.

A petition from Owen Connolly and others was presented, praying for the passing of an Act to enable the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation of Diocese of Charlottetown, to hold a certain piece of land for a Burial Ground. Petition was referred to special committee to bring in the Bill, which was accordingly done, and read a first time and referred to Private Bill Committee.
Mr. J. R. McLEAN asked if it was the intention to build a new and higher Bridge on Main Post Road, at Big Pond, Lot 45, during the present summer.
Mr. CAMPBELL replied—No.
Mr. J. R. McLEAN asked if it was the intention to open a new road between the farms of J. J. and J. A. Beaton, East Point, Lot 47, during the present summer.
Mr. CAMPBELL replied he could not find any petition praying for such road.

Mr. J. R. McLEAN asked if the new Bridge would be built at Norris Pond, Lot 45, this summer.
Mr. CAMPBELL said a sum of money would be placed in estimates for such structure.
Mr. J. R. McLEAN asked if new roads would be opened at Bull Creek, Lot 46, this summer, between farms of Joseph McEchern and Joseph McAulay.
Mr. CAMPBELL replied such road will be made.
Mr. J. R. McLEAN asked if main road at Souris Beach would be repaired without delay.
Mr. CAMPBELL replied improvements will be made.

Mr. J. R. McLEAN asked if a grant would be made for repairs of road from Souris West to Rollo Bay, this summer.
Mr. CAMPBELL said a grant had been included for that work.
Mr. J. R. McLEAN asked if the new road will be opened from Bear River Line Road to New Zealand Road, this summer.
Mr. CAMPBELL said the Government would not be justified in opening said road.
Mr. J. R. McLEAN asked if Kelly's Road, Lot 45, will be improved this summer.
Mr. CAMPBELL said that route ran through heavy hardwood and swamp. To open it a man must move his barn. It was the Government's intention to do so.

Mr. J. R. McLEAN said that the parties had agreed to open the road free of cost. It would be great accommodation.
House adjourned till Monday, at 3 p. m.
