Mt. Herbert Cow Given Top Dual Purpose Rating

A Mt. Herbert cow, Limewood Daisy K. Gwynne, was the top Dual Purpose Shorthorn cow in Canada for 1965 in the mature class, and she has also merited a Gold Seal certificate for completing five years in a row with production of 10,000 pounds of milk or more.

Daisy, owned by Sterling Wood and Son, was the grand champion Dual Purpose Shorthorn female at the Atlantic Winter Fair last year.

A number of other Island Dual Purpose Shorthorn cattle have established creditable records in record of performance tests, it is indicated in the current issue of the Shorthorn News.

The Wood cow produced 14,265 pounds of milk, 576 pounds fat in her lactation. In the 305-day period her production was 13,290 pounds milk, 542 pounds fat. Her breed class averages were 190 for milk, 194 for butterfat.

A stagemate, Limewood Jessie Wave, produced more than 10,000 pounds of milk in her most recent lactation. Her BCAs of 138 milk, 134 butterfat were compiled for the 305-day period when she produced 9,663 pounds milk, 374 fat.

Limewood Hannah Mimosa produced 7,715 pounds milk, 331 fat for BCAs of 113 milk, 122 fat. Norma Jean produced 6,039 pounds milk, 221 fat. All of the above were mature cows.

In the two-year old class Limewood Terry Duchess produced 5,155 pounds milk, 231 pounds butterfat for the Wood family.

NUMBER OF RECORDS
Keith Barrett's Oceanbrae herd from Lot 16 has a number of good records.

Roan Polly produced 7,645 pounds milk, 299 fat for BCAs of

115 milk, 112 butterfat. Other mature cows qualifying were Oceanbrae Polly, Oceanbrae Lily and Hillhead Daisy Charm.

Mr. Barrett's Roseleigh Roxy produced 9,554 pounds milk, 391 pounds fat for BCAs of 144 milk, 147 fat as a four-year old.

Hillhead Roan Belle produced 7,403 pounds milk, 314 fat for BCAs of 124 and 191 as a three-year old heifer.

Hillhead Joan produced 6,477 pounds milk, 247 fat for BCAs of 109 and 104. Another three-year-old qualifying was Westside Rosebud 7.

Westside April Rosebud produced 7,504 pounds milk, 278 fat for BCAs of 138 milk, 128 fat for the Barrett herd as a two-year-old heifer.

Waldron MacPhee's Elmwyck herd from Elmwood turned in a number of good records. A mature cow, Elmwyck Lill produced 7,692 pounds milk, 285 fat for BCAs of 107 milk, 99 fat as a mature cow.

His four-year old heifer Betty produced 7,949 pounds milk, 318 fat for BCAs of 125 in milk and fat and Lady Queenie earned BCAs of 122 in milk and fat with 7,251 pounds milk, 268 fat and his Hillhead Kirklevington BCAs of 122 milk, 116 fat with 7,386 pounds milk, 263 fat.

Mr. MacPhee's Elmwyck Jessie earned BCAs of 123 in milk, 120 in fat with 6,362 pounds milk, 249 fat.

The Hillhead names in the Barrett and MacPhee herds are there because both of these men purchased several head of cat-

tles at the Hillhead dispersal sale in Ontario about one year ago. A number of cows in the herd of Daniel P. Jewell, North River also qualified in ROP.

They included Chestnut Royal Queen 3 with 7,142 pounds milk, 290 fat for BCAs of 99 milk, 101 fat as a mature cow.

Chestnut Royal Milady 4 earned BCAs of 105 milk, 109 fat with 7,030 pounds milk, 290 fat as a four-year old heifer.

Chestnut Royal Sally 2 earned BCAs of 107 milk, 106 fat 6,646 pounds milk, 267 fat as a three-year old.

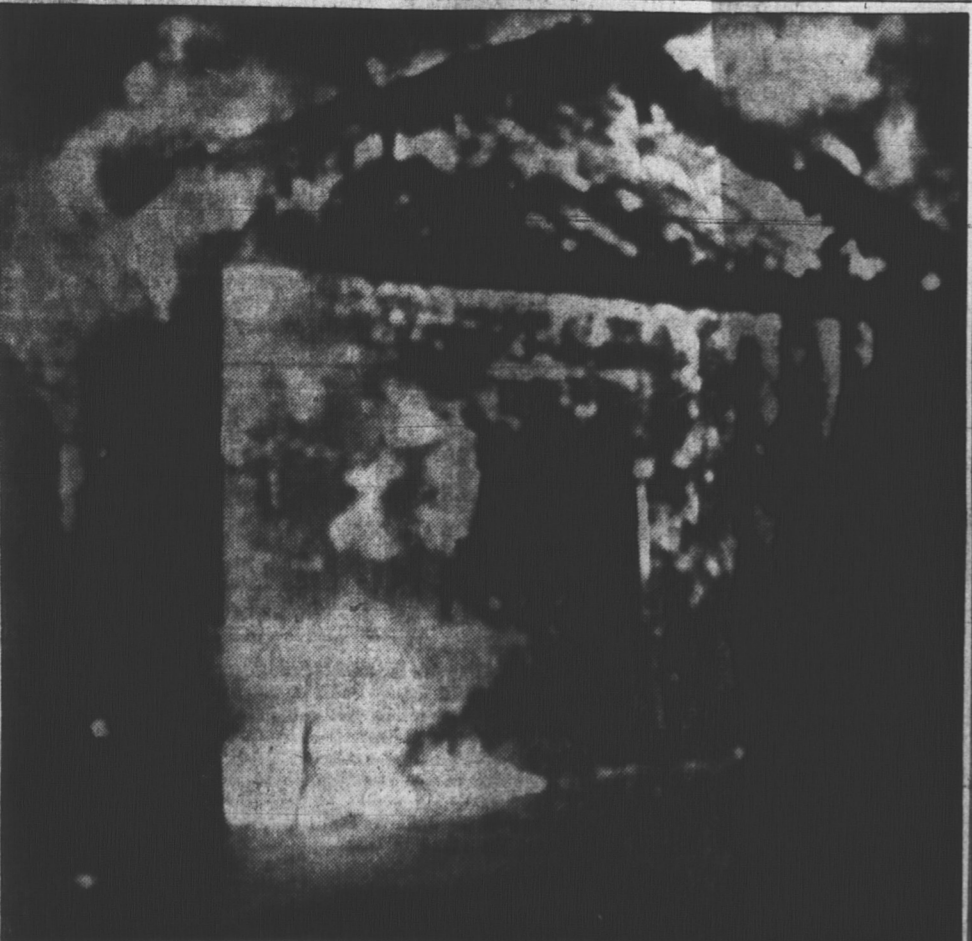
This follows a meeting that was held Saturday February 12 in Breadalbane hall which turned out to be the largest meeting of farmers in the province for a long time.

It is expected to get underway about 8.00 o'clock on Saturday night.

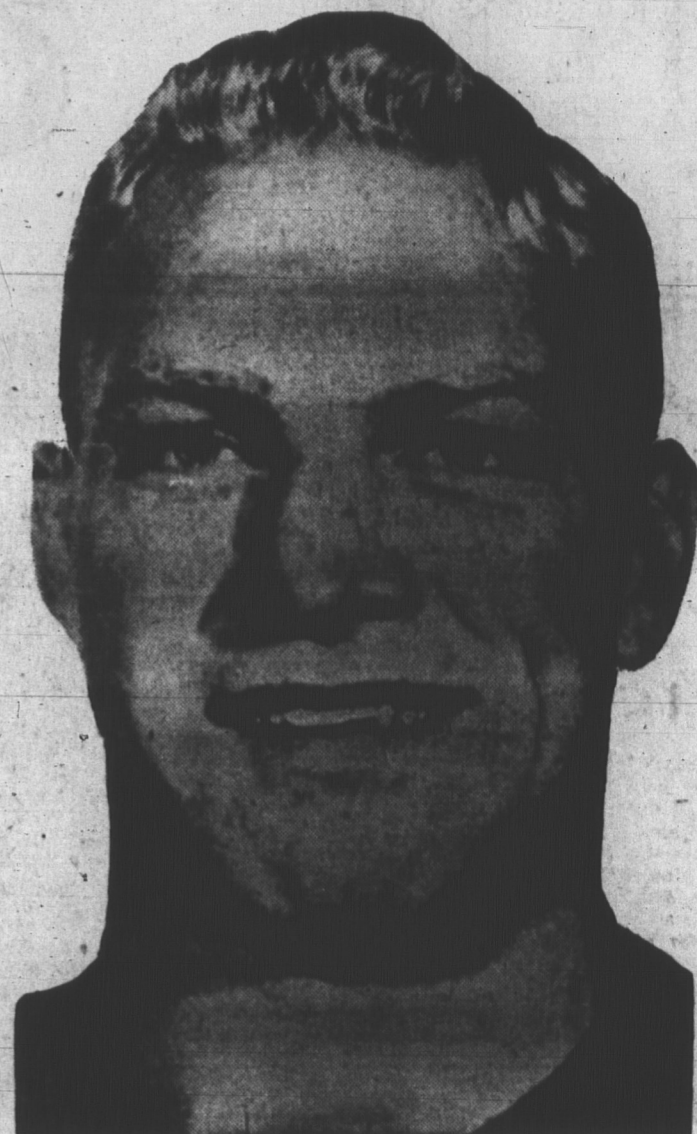


WAREHOUSE SEVERELY DAMAGED

A warehouse belonging to Alban Lecky, North Bedeque, was severely damaged by fire last night, apparently caused by either an oil stove used to heat the building or faulty wiring. Mrs. John Lecky, daughter-in-law of the warehouse owner first noticed the fire. The Summerside fire department got the call at 5.15, and the RCAF Station and Kensington fire departments also were at the scene. The warehouse containing 12,000 to 15,000 bushels of potatoes belonging to Thane Ellis Ltd. which were stored in the cellar rented by that firm, a tractor, two car bodies, a tractor plow and a set of bobsleds. As far as could be determined last night, the potatoes were not extensively damaged. They were insured by Thane, Ellis Ltd. and Mr. Lecky had insurance on the building, which cost \$10,000 to build some 20 years ago. The tractor was destroyed, as were the bobsleds, but the plow was not badly damaged. The car bodies were of small value.

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
