The Insurrectionary Movement in Spain.

MADRID, Sept. 3. The recall of an order preceded by a circular from Gen. Martinez Campos, Minister of War, in relation to the insurrectionary outbreak in Spain, was gazetted to-day. It provides that any officer, if a sergeant, proved to be a member of a Republican military society, or any other secret society, shall be dismissed and prosecuted besides.

A Train Accident—Forty Lives Lost.

BERLIN, Sept. 3. As a train from Berlin was passing Steglitz yesterday it ran into a crowd of people who were intending to take a return to Berlin. They were pressing forward to enter the carriage on the wrong side. The number killed and wounded is estimated at forty.

The Jewish Troubles.

SLAGONNA, Sept. 3. Two thousand peasants invaded Krakina yesterday for the purpose of attacking the Jews in that place. The mob was fired upon by the militia. One man was killed and three wounded. Fourteen peasants were arrested.

The Cholera.

ALEXANDRIA, Sept. 3. An official report shows that since the outbreak of cholera there were 27,818 deaths in Egypt. There have been 140 deaths among the British troops stationed in Egypt.

Heavy Fire.

VIENNA, Sept. 3. A fire broke out in a timber yard near this city, to-day. The flames spread to a number of adjoining houses. The loss is estimated at several millions florins.

Count de Chambord's Funeral.

VIENNA, Sept. 3. The Archduke Louis Victor will represent the Emperor Francis Joseph at the funeral of Count de Chambord.

The Java Calamity.

LONDON, Sept. 3. It is believed that one hundred thousand lives were lost in Java's calamity.

Yellow Jack.

HAVANA, Sept. 3. Twenty-nine deaths from yellow fever during the past week.

Cricket.

HALIFAX, Sept. 3. The Wanderers of this city defeated the Moncton Cricket Club.

A Heavy Gale.

LONDON, Sept. 3. There has been a heavy gale throughout England, continuing Saturday night and Sunday, doing much damage. There are many wrecks and some loss of life.

Shipping Disasters.

PLYMOUTH, Mass., Sept. 3. The schr. "Melo" of St. John, N. B., on entering the harbor this morning, struck on Brown's Island shoal. She bilged and filled with water. The crew were taken off by the men at Ganget Life Saving Station.

LONDON, Sept. 3. The British barque David, which left Liverpool July 20 for St. John, N. B., has returned. She jettisoned part of her cargo.

It is rumored that the General Trans-Atlantic Company's steamer "Amerique" which sailed from Havre yesterday for New York, has foundered. She passed the Lizard all right last night.

Notes from Summerside.

The oyster fishery commenced Saturday, and by the close of the navigation it is supposed 30,000 barrels will be shipped to Montreal, Quebec and St. John.

Mr. McMillan's fine new Brigantine was launched on Saturday. She is intended for the West India trade and classed A 1 10 years at Lloyds.

The steam tug "Frank C. Batt" is expected here from Charlottetown with a large raft of hard pine spars, imported from Georgia by John F. Robertson, Esq.

John Yeo, Esq., has returned from Miramichi where he was chartering his big ship of 800 tons.

The hon. W. G. Strong, along with Mr. Heard, Mr. Cowperthwaite and Mr. Teed, are gone to Belleville, Ontario, as delegates to the Methodist Conference.

Prostrated by Winds.

A SECOND SABBY GALE AT CAPE BRETON.

The gale of Wednesday night was very severe at Cape Breton. It equalled in fury the great storm of August, 1873, but was of shorter duration and accompanied by thunder and lightning. The only large vessel at anchor here, the Camperdown was driven three miles up the harbor. Several small schooners received slight damage by collisions. The tide during the gale rose to the top of the wharves. A large number of houses were stripped of their shingles and chimneys and fences were blown down in every direction. The tower of the new Catholic Church, in course of construction, was blown down and completely destroyed, involving a loss to the contractor of about \$800. One new building was moved bodily a foot from its foundation.

A number of vessels are reported ashore and two total wrecks at Cow Bay. The breakwater at that place, and Archibald & Co.'s and Belloni & Co.'s wharves received considerable damage. Torrents of rain fell during the gale, swelling streams to an unusual extent, washing out bridges and embankments. Telegraphic communication with outposts has been wholly suspended until Friday, on account of the prostration of the wires, and the pressure of business prevents getting particulars of marine disasters. One or two accidents to men on vessels at Cow Bay are reported, but no lives are lost, as far as known. Grave fears are felt for the safety of the steamer "Tunstall," which sailed from Sydney for Montreal on the evening of the gale.

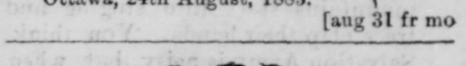
