U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, (AP) - The magazine Steel reports today that the "first faint signs of an upturn in steel production are evident."

In its weekly summary of the metal-working industry, Steel says: "Although steel ingot production continued to decline last week, there were more ups than downs in order placement. That noteworthy for the new orders placed now determine the ingot rate in the next month. The present ingot rate reflects orders booked several weeks ago and then ordering was shrinking."

Despite the shrinking demand for steel plate so far this year, some producers in looking back have detected a mild upturn in the past two or three weeks, the magazine says.

"It is so slight it is scarcely discernible in day-to-day trading," Steel continues, "but it's apparent when viewed from a greater distance."

The magazine also says that although some producers have not observed an increase, they do agree that buying has not declined and that there has been an increase in the "rush" type orders.

This "rush" business, Steel says, indicates consumer inventories are becoming depleted. Overstocked inventories have been blamed for part of the drop in steel business.

Net income for the year, however, declined to \$68,061,006, or \$5.53, from the previous year's \$76,844,952, or \$6.29 a share, exclusive of a special credit that year of \$9,630,351 derived from the sale of an investment.

Red Wings Lead Series With 3-1 Win Over Leafs

(By Gerry Loughede, Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, (CP) - Little Tony Leswick, more noted for his checking ability than scoring prowess, and a couple of high-powered defencemen led Detroit Red Wings to a 3-1 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs Saturday night in their Stanley Cup semi-final series.

The result gave the Wings a 2-1 margin in games with the fourth contest of the best-of-seven round scheduled here Tuesday night.

Rearguard Red Kelly, injured during the closing weeks of the National Hockey League schedule and used only sparingly in the playoffs so far, opened the scoring near the 10-minute mark of the first period with the best goal of the night.

Sixth in the season's scoring race with 49 points, Kelly picked up Gordie Howe's pass near the Toronto blue line, stickhanded through a wobbly Leaf defence and beat goalie Harry Lumley with a close-in backhand shot.

Second Scoreless Right-winger George Armstrong got that one back for the Leafs nine minutes later, sinking line-mate Tod Sloan's passout from behind the Detroit cage. The second period was scoreless.

The 13,334 fans were scarcely settled in the net with a minute and 38 seconds of play left in favor of an extra attacker. The move boomeranged 16 seconds later as defenceman Marcel Pronovost trapped the puck near the Detroit blue line and drilled it 100 feet into the vacant net. Lumley returned to his post after that but the deflated Leafs never threatened.

Referee Red Storey handed out seven minor penalties, four to the Wings. Only two figured in the scoring: Leswick and Leafs' Tim Stewart were off for high-sticking each other midway through the opening period when Kelly started the Wings off.
