Tignish Rec. Association Holds Annual Meeting

TIGNISH — Encouraging reports on the success of the newly-erected Centennial Community Sports Arena, Red Cross Water Safety Swimming course, and all-around sports program and entertainment highlighted the annual meeting of the Tignish Sports Recreation Association held here Thursday evening. The financial statement given by the Treasurer, Franklin Perry reported a total income of \$15,374.25 with expenses totalling \$432.85. \$1,815.14 is still outstanding on the new arena.

The president, Philip Harper gave a very detailed and complete outline of the year's activities, reported nine regular meetings were held by the Board of Directors, one special meeting and two general meetings. All meetings, he said, were well attended. Some financial problems did arise during the year when the rink building was not in operation, but the directors were able to borrow and pay back the money when the summer program got underway. \$2,300 was reported transferred to the arena building fund.

The president said it was a very busy and full year as proven by the financial statement.

SUMMERSIDE — Opening up with three touchdowns in the final quarter of play, Summerside High School blanked Montague, 25-0, to remain in contention for the Potato Bowl — the championship of the Prince Edward Island Interscholastic Senior Football League.

The Saturday win sets the locals up for the final two games of the season with a 2-2 record. In their final contests, Summerside meet Souris Regional High and St. Dunstan's High School of Charlottetown, both having 3-1 won-lost marks.

The loss by Montague eliminated them from the championship game, which will pit the first two finishers against each other.

Summerside touchdowns were scored by Chuck Lapp, Gary Desborough, Bob Clive, and Owen McAusland. Danny MacNeil had a convert on the final T.D.

Clive was extra good at quarter-back for the locals as he tossed eight completed passes out of 12 attempts. Montague's Bob Hayes had three completions on eight passes. In the early part of the game, he threw two completed passes, but both were called back due to team infractions.

Montague was penalized for 35 yards, while Summerside—who controlled the ball most of the game—were set back 95 yards on penalties. There were two interceptions—one by each team. Summerside had 16 first downs, while Montague picked up six.

Chuck Lapp scored Summerside's first TD early in the second quarter, as the fullback took a handoff from Quarterback Clive, and went off the left tackle to score. An attempted convert was no good.

Low Of 30 In Summerside

SUMMERSIDE — A low of 32 degrees was registered at the local Canadian Forces Base weather station Sunday morning, with a predicted overnight low last night of 27 degrees.

The 32 reading came between seven and nine o'clock Sunday morning, and the maximum temperature recorded during the day was 34 degrees.

The record for this period was set in 1940 when the thermometer went down to 20 degrees.

No apparent damage was caused when winds of 30 to 35 miles, with gusts to 50 miles per hour hit this area. The winds will be slowly decreasing from now until this evening.

The temperature reached a day-time low of 30 degrees between 10 and 11 o'clock last night.

Tignish Lobster Fishermen Meet

TIGNISH—Will there or won't there be a lobster trap limit in district 7B for the spring season of 1967? And if so when will the fishermen be notified? These two questions were highly discussed at an open meeting for fishermen held in the Legion hall at Tignish Wednesday night.

A large turn-out of fishermen with varied opinions about a trap limit and license restrictions attended the meeting called to order by Harvey Dawson and chaired by Charles Gavin.

Mr. Dawson, who spoke strongly in favor of a trap limit, is pressing for an early reply to this question from the Federal Department of Fisheries so fishermen will not build a great number of traps and then be notified they can only fish a certain number.

Herbert Cheverie, officer in charge in the area, spoke on the success and satisfaction of the trap limit in District 8 that extended from Brae to North Cape. Warren Farrar, district protection officer with the Department of Fisheries, spoke on various meetings held across the Island and discussions heard on trap limits for districts 7 and 8.
