

Eskimo Pleads Guilty, Is Ordered Sent Home

MONTREAL (CP) — Jostie Tookook, brought to Montreal 10 days ago to face charges of assaulting a man at his home at Great Whale River 600 miles north of here, pleaded guilty to the charge but Judge Irene Lagarde ordered the Quebec Provincial Police to return him to his home.

The charge against the 38-year-old Eskimo said he assaulted John L. Keating Dec. 8 and left him lying in the snow.

Keating was found later suffering from severe frostbite. He was flown to a Montreal hospital where his condition now is satisfactory.

Judge Lagarde said he would impose a one-day sentence.

Behind Tookook's arraignment lies a legal tangle which Judge Lagarde said was the fault of the QPP and provincial

Prank Case Judgment Reserved

OTTAWA (CP) — Judgment was reserved Friday in the Supreme court of Canada on a \$180,000 damage action arising from a Halloween prank.

Robert M. Jennings, 2, a Barrie, Ont., business executive was put in hospital for life and his wife was killed when two cars collided Nov. 8, 1961, in an intersection of a concession road and Ontario Highway 12 just south of Beaverton.

Evidence showed that a stop sign on the concession road where it meets the highway had been turned in the wrong direction by schoolboys four days earlier — the day after Halloween.

An action was launched against the Ontario highways department for failure to maintain the highway properly and against Garry Crossberry, 23, of Toronto, driver of the second car which entered the intersection from the concession road without making a stop.

AWARDED DAMAGES
At the trial, the Jennings family was awarded damages of \$145,795. The department was ordered to pay 80 per cent, Crossberry the remainder.

The Ontario Appeal Court upheld the decision but increased the amount of damages to \$180,000.

In a three-day hearing before the Supreme Court which ended Friday, lawyers for the highway department argued that the stop sign was not part of the highway. It was located outside the physical confines of the right-of-way upon which the highway was built.

R. V. Smiley of Toronto, appearing for the Jennings, replied that provincial acts make clear that a highway is more than a roadway or the travelled portion of the highway.

OFFERED LIQUOR

Hays Future Is Uncertain

OTTAWA (CP) — Harry Hays has left the federal cabinet but his political future still is in doubt.

Mr. Hays, appointed agriculture minister when the Liberals took office in 1963, was defeated in Calgary South in the Nov. 8 election.

Mr. Pearson told a press conference he hopes to be able to use Mr. Hays and that they will meet Monday in Ottawa.

Mr. Hays is anxious to maintain his contact with federal politics, he said.

There had been speculation Mr. Hays would be appointed to the Senate and remain agriculture minister. But this was dashed with the appointment of J. J. Greene of Renfrew to the post—the first easterner to hold it in more than 50 years.

Head Of International Bank Holds Talks On Kariba Dam

SALISBURY (AP) — J. Burke Knapp, vice-president of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, discussed the Kariba Power Station with officials of the Central African Power Corporation.

Knapp said he was "not proposing anything" to the higher authority of the power corporation. The Kariba station is jointly owned and managed by the Rhodesian and Zambian governments through the corporation.

Knapp said: "If the Smith government and the government of Zambia can agree on a useful role or function for us we are anxious to help."

The World Bank provided a loan of \$6,000,000 for construction of the dam.

Prime Minister Ian Smith has refused to pay Rhodesia's share because the British government raised the London assets of the Rhodesian reserve bank. He said Britain now is responsible for the Rhodesian debt.

President Kenneth Kaunda of Zambia has insisted Britain invade Rhodesia with British troops to place the power generators on the Rhodesian side of the Zambezi River under protection.

The British government has refused to use force.

Knapp said he hopes to see Smith, who announced the British colony's independence Nov. 11, today.

After his talks here, Knapp will go to Lusaka to see Kaunda. He said the bank is vitally interested in seeing projects it supports "produce fruitful results for the countries undertaking them."

The basic purpose of his visit was to get first hand knowledge of Kariba's operation and to see whether there is any way the World Bank "in its proper competence" could be helpful.
