"Now who will plant the red hen", we chuckled to James at supper. A quiet gray had settled above the fields and the wind in the new leaves was edged, we knew, with a wintry chill.

"Oh I reckon I will, Ellen," he replied with a smile a bit shy. "It won't take long. It's cold but it will be as well to have it done."

Who else, it came to mind? Who but James himself who has managed the sowing at Alderside since his early teens should sow the one patch of grain on the home-farm this year, the only cultivated piece amid the green of the pastures and haylands.

The sowing and the "barrowing in" which comes in the wake of the broadcast seeding was the main interest on these farms of the name, this week. The mostly pleasant, indeed sometimes ideal June days kept man, horse and old seeder busy, with Rob sometimes spelling James at the rite.

Last evening through the sunset and on into the dusk, we spent with James and the children at the sowing up at "the other farm" enjoying much the picturesque scenes about there: the old orchard, its great trees bent by the winds of years, in pink and white blossom, and all the loveliness of the June-time, now spread on field and woodland and all that reach of the valley. For there too the millstream flows and Alders bend above it. And on the slope beyond, on a wide pasture bounded on three sides

by the green of hedgerows, the ewes and their lambs stay. Early these days the farmers come to their fields if skies encourage them, and the work may continue into the night. Meals are not so leisurely, with the cropping calling. But from our table by the window we catch an elfin rustle in the poplar by the gateway, note a hummingbird pause before a white lilac's door, see sunny white clouds flock above a green hilltop and an old mill dream in the valley below. June is a precious month fresh and beautiful.

May brought Mothers' Day. And June salutes the Dad! What a rare brotherhood they are, those whose every thought is directed to the welfare of the family over whom they keep the sheltering roof. How fondly his children regard him, the sons' dearest wish to be "Just Like Dad."

"Well, what are you going to be, my boy? When you have reached manhood's years: A doctor, a lawyer, or actor great, Moving throngs to laughter and tears?"

But he shook his head as he gave reply in a serious way he had: "I don't think I'd care to be any of them: I want to be like my Dad!"
