It is stated that the Dominion Government has determined to dispatch a revenue cutter to Hudson's Bay, for the purpose of suppressing smuggling, which is said to be going on by that channel. At the same time it is probable that arrangements will be made to send out surveyors to ascertain whether the Bay is navigable during the winter months, and the best location for a summer port.

A good many people are no doubt gratified at the sentence of fourteen years' hard labor in the Dorchester Penitentiary passed on Theal of St. John's. The sentence is not only severe but righteous. The conduct meriting that sentence was brutal in the extreme. Let us hope that the punishment in this case will operate wholesomely as a deterrent on any persons here inclined to imitate Theal's proceedings.—E.A.

RAILWAY COMMUNICATION, which has been suspended on account of snow and ice on the track, has resumed. The eastern trains are running on time. The western train from Summerside arrived here at 3:30 this afternoon, and the train for Summerside left Royalton Junction at 2:30 this p. m. The train which ran off the track at County Line, yesterday morning, arrived here this forenoon. The train going west from Summerside reached Tignish this afternoon.

THE BORER WORM.—This insect, so destructive to vessels' bottoms elsewhere, has for some time past been suspected of infesting the waters of the Bay of Fundy. On the 10th inst., several pieces of timber from the docks of Digby and New Brunswick were received at the Department of Railways and Canals, Ottawa, to show the ravages caused by these insects to the wharves in the places referred to. The timbers were completely perforated by the worms.—E.A.

A SHORT time ago the Irish Societies of Montreal made an investigation into a charge made in a New York periodical insinuating that Montreal contained a Fenian infirmary. Mr. F. B. McNamee was believed to be the party referred to, and took occasion to deny the charge, supporting his denial with a letter from Sir John Macdonald. Now the Montreal Post has reiterated the charge, and added others of even a more serious nature. The result is that an action for libel has been entered by Mr. McNamee.

The counsel for Mason, the man who attempted to shoot Guiteau and was recently sentenced to severe penalties, has prepared a petition for a writ of habeas corpus, on the ground that a court-martial has no jurisdiction in time of peace, and that even if jurisdiction exists, the punishment inflicted is excessive and illegal. Mason says he don't want to be pardoned by any Guiteau President, and merely asks that provision should be made for the support of his wife and family.

The prospects of a good wheat crop in the United States is encouraging. A Cincinnati dispatch of the 16th says:—Reports from the wheat crop, covering points in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Michigan, Kentucky and Tennessee, and from a few places in other Western States, from which it makes the conclusion that the winter crop of wheat now promises an outcome equal to any previous year, and if the spring sowing is an average one the wheat crop of 1882 may be counted on as reaching 500,000,000 bushels, with the chances of even larger results than the wheat crop of 1880.

A DISPATCH from Winnipeg states that during the fire some land brokers are said to have obtained access surreptitiously to the books and papers of the Engineering Department of the Syndicate. As a consequence every clerk has been discharged. The syndicate has determined to locate stations on its own lands only, even if it should be necessary in some cases to change the route of the road. It is also stated that at the dictation of the Syndicate the Government has withdrawn from entry all even numbered sections on the C. P. R. and its branches. Intending settlers have been warned accordingly.

A SPECIAL CABLE to the Toronto Mail says Boyl is reported in splendid condition. He made a trial Thursday morning, which is said to have astonished his friends and has led to a large sum of money being sent to London from the north to back him. Hanlan is within two pounds of his weight and is as fit as he can be made. Every day he goes out for a couple of spins and tackles everything on the river. He is cheerful and it is needless to say confident. Trickett, while rowing at top speed on the 16th had a collision on the river and smashed his Warin boat to atoms, having to swim and wade ashore.

An interesting suit at law, involving a husband's right to his wife's wedding present, has recently been decided in England by Lord Chief Justice Coleridge. Under an execution issued by a milliner defendant for an indebtedness contracted by the wife before her marriage, a sheriff had seized certain jewelry, valued at \$5,850, to satisfy a judgment for \$5,000. The lady's husband, Mr. Williams, a gentleman of fortune, brought suit to recover this jewelry, and showed that it had been given to Mr. Williams by her friends, at the time of her marriage as wedding presents. Lord Coleridge ruled that, under the circumstances, the property had passed to the husband, and the defendant had no right to it in satisfaction of a judgment obtained against the separate estate of his wife.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

The Budget Debate.

Speech by A. C. McDonald, Esq., M. P.

The Opposition's Twenty per cent. Policy.

OTTAWA, March 22. Mr. Bechar, M. P., resumed the debate on the Budget yesterday. He was followed by Mr. Burpee who repeated the old, threadbare arguments of the Brits which were much muddled by bewildering figures.

Mr. A. C. McDonald, M. P., King's Co., spoke next. He made a practical and concise speech, in which he stated that the farmers of Prince Edward Island were never more prosperous than they are at the present time; general prosperity prevailed throughout the rural districts of the Province, and this fact was evinced by the largely increased deposits of the Savings Bank. He stated that he would like to see the bounty which the Government were to give our fishermen, made permanent, for fear the Brits would regain power, and then the bounty would be cancelled. He also, during his speech, remarked that the people of the Maritime Provinces were, for the past year, busily engaged in mercantile and agricultural pursuits, that goods of all kinds were now cheaper than they were previous to the present government's accession to power, and closed his speech by paying a high compliment to the Government for its success in every measure it had undertaken, particularly the National Policy.

Messrs. King, Killam, White, Fleming, and Beatty continued the debate. The Opposition are so far unable to formulate any policy except one involving a twenty per cent. tariff on all classes of goods; and seem to be in despair as to their chances in the next election. A heavy snow storm is prevailing in the surrounding country.

GENERAL NEWS.

OTTAWA, March 21.

In the House of Commons, to-day, Mr. Bechar resumed the debate on the Budget. He was followed by Hon. Isaac Burpee. Mr. Macdonald, of P. E. Island, followed him. He denied the truth of the statements that the N. P. was unpopular in Prince Edward Island. There were no complaints against it there. The people were prosperous and contented, and business was never in a more flourishing condition.

LONDON, March 20.

Twenty-five houses have been burned near Northampton, and a hundred persons rendered homeless. In the Commons this evening, Mr. Gladstone submitted a message from the Queen, asking provision for Prince Leopold upon his approaching marriage. Mr. Gladstone announced that he would, on Thursday, move to consider the same.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 21.

There will be a Court dinner here to-morrow to celebrate the birthday of the Emperor William of Germany.

BERLIN, Mar. 21.

The Prussian Economic Council to-day rejected the tobacco monopoly bill, and afterwards adopted a resolution in favor of higher tax on tobacco.

VIENNA, March 21.

A fire in Emod, Hungary, has resulted in the destruction of 350 houses, and the loss of nine lives.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 21.

The strong shocks of earthquake have been felt in Chios. The people have taken refuge in tents.

Team Communication with the Magdalen Islands.

LETTERS addressed to the Postmaster General will be received at Ottawa until noon on WEDNESDAY, the 5th of APRIL NEXT, for the conveyance of Her Majesty's Mails by steamer once a week, during the season of Navigation between Pictou, N. S., and the Magdalen Islands and Gaspe, under a contract for four years, commencing with the opening of navigation in 1882.

The steamer to leave Pictou on such regular day in each week as the Postmaster General may appoint, and proceed to Amherst and Cape de Meule, Magdalen Islands, and returning once only at the Islands for exchange of Mails, to return to Pictou, calling both ways and exchanging Mails at Georgetown and Souris, Prince Edward Island. On every fourth trip the steamer is to proceed from the Magdalen Islands to Gaspe and back before returning to Pictou, calling for exchange of Mails at Gaspe Basin, and at Percé weather permitting. The Postmaster General will require a first-class sea-going steamer for this service, and the tender must give a full description of the steamer offered—specifying name, tonnage, speed and accommodation for passengers and freight, also the price asked for each round weekly trip between Pictou and the Magdalen Islands, and for each monthly round trip between the Islands and Gaspe.

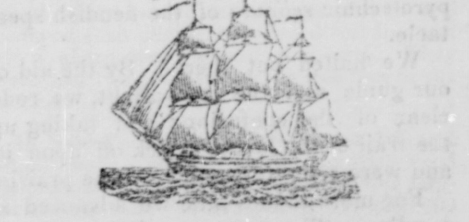
