NEW YORK

NEW YORK (AP) Once again the stock market backed away from an early advance and closed mixed Thursday. Volume was 8,800,000 compared with 9,010,000 Wednesday. The Dow Jones industrial average closed down .56 at 990.36. Standard and Poor's 500-stock index dipped .03 to 93.67. The Associated Press average gained 1.1 at 369.4, due to a rise of the rail component and strength in selected industrials. Commonwealth Oil was the most active stock, rising 1/4 to 2 1/2 on 162,300 shares. A. T. and T. ACTIVE American Telephone, Wednesday's most active issue, slipped to second place as it eased 1/4 to 60, equalling the 1955-56 low. Talks between A. T. and T. and Western Union over possible sale of the company's TWX service to Western Union were linked with a rise of 3/4 in Western Union's stock. Coppers showed strength, Kennecott gaining 3/4, American Smelting & American Reefs jumping 3/4. Among Canadian issues traded, Hudson Bay Mining and the Distillers Seagraves and McIntyre Porcupine rose 1/4. Dome Mines were up 1/4. Canadian Pacific was down 1/4. Prices were mixed on the American Exchange. Volume was 3,900,000 shares compared with 4,180,000 Wednesday. Scurry Rainbow Oil gained 1/4 and Jupiter Corp. and Preston 1/4. Canadian Marconi fell 1/4. MONTREAL

MONTREAL (CP) — Stock prices edged slightly lower at the close of moderately active trading Thursday on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges. Base metals moved higher, but all other sections on the two exchanges eased at the final bell. The composite index slipped 0.17 at 163.85. Declines led advances 95 to 79. The industrial volume was 180,700 shares, mines and oils 1,285,100, compared with 200,000 and 1,543,000 Wednesday. In the base metal section, Inco rose 1/4 to 28 and International Nickel 1/4 to a high of 105 1/2. Among the primary issues Dominion Bridge fell 1/4 to 27 1/2 and Aluminum 1/4 to 31. Banks were off 0.05 at 137.25. Royal fell one point to 70 1/2 and Toronto-Dominion 1/4 to 67. Montreal slipped 1/4 to 6 and Nova Scotia 1/4 to 75 1/2. PAPERS DECLINED Papers declined 0.37 to 123.57. Fraser eased 1/4 to 31 1/2 and Price Bros. 1/4 to 41 1/2. Domatic dipped 1/4 to 20. Utilities were up most of the day but fell 0.05 at 155.88 at the close. Quebec Telephone and Interprovincial Pipe Line dropped 1/4 to 22 1/2 and 87 1/2. CPR slipped 1/4 to 65 1/2 and Trans Mountain Pipe Line 1/4 to 18. The industrial index declined 0.06 at 170.26, but individual issues were steady. The food and beverage section was down. Walker-Gooderham fell 1/4 to 35 1/2 and Molson 1/4 to 33 1/2. Senior oils were lower with Texaco and B-A slipping 1/4 to 57 1/2 and 31. Shell went against the trend by jumping 1/4 to a high of 22 1/2. The trade and finance section was lower with Hudson Bay Co. dipping 1/4 to 15. Speculative mines and oils were off. Midpex in a turnover of 11,840 shares dropped 60 cents to \$5.00 and Kodak 20 cents to \$2.75. Patricia Silver fluctuating all day and had declined 15 cents to \$1.70 by the final bell.

TORONTO

TORONTO (CP) — D'Eldons Gold Mines plunged 1.34 to 1.41, on more than 1,750,000 shares and dragged other speculative issues sharply down in heavy trading on the Toronto Stock Exchange Thursday. Latest results of the company's exploratory drilling near Rouyn, Que., showed low ore content. Wilco slid 42 to 68 cents on more than 751,000 shares. Satellite lost 11 to 50 cents, with Jonamith down 5 1/2 to 32 cents. Banks led industrials lower. Royal and Montreal fell 1/4 to 79 1/2 and 65 1/2 and Nova Scotia 1/4 to 75. Atlantic Sugar was off 1/4 to 27 1/2. Among golds, Dome and Hollinger were ahead 1/4 to 41 1/2 and 37. Base metals were lower with Steep Rock losing 30 cents to 7.10 and Campbell Chibougamau 20 cents to 8.05. Asamera paced western oils as it gained 25 cents to 2.65 and Alminex 5 cents to 4.68. Canadian Export Gas was off 1/2 cents to 3.80. On index, industrials down 42 to 174.88, base metals 23 to 90.61, and the TSX 35 to 105.58. Golds were up 1.30 to 174.08 and western oils 31 to 109.40. Volume was 7,926,000 shares compared with 6,813,000 ednesday.
