**ISLAND GIRL DROWNED.**—Last evening Marshal Cameron received a telegram from A. Tarbox, Chief of Police at West Newton, Mass., stating that Miss Lizzie Cahill, aged 25, stopping at O. S. Valentine's, Washington street, Welleley's Hill, was drowned Thursday night at Newton. Marshal Cameron went to the home of the Misses Cahill, corner of Richmond and Cumberland Streets, and notified them of the death of Miss Cahill, who had been adopted by them when a child. She left the Island about a year ago. The remains may be brought home.

**CREELMAN IN AUSTRALIA.**—Mr. Geo. J. Barrett, of Fredericton, has a short letter from his friend Karl Creelman, Truro, who started in the spring of 1899 upon a bicycling tour around the world. Creelman was at the time of writing, June 20th, at McKay, Queensland, Australia. He was then in quarantine, as the citizens were afraid of bubonic plague, Creelman having been in the infested districts of Sydney, Brisbane, Bundaburg, and Rockhampton. He was well and had little fear of the plague. He writes that there is not as much cycling in Australia as in Canada but that the wheelmen there are very enthusiastic.—Moncton Times.

**NIGHT SPORTS.**—Here is what THE EXAMINER had to say about the last Electric Light Sports held in Charlottetown:—"That Electric Light sports are a drawing card and a big one at that,—was once more made evident last evening. The grand stand was entirely filled, while a closely packed crowd lined along the stretches." 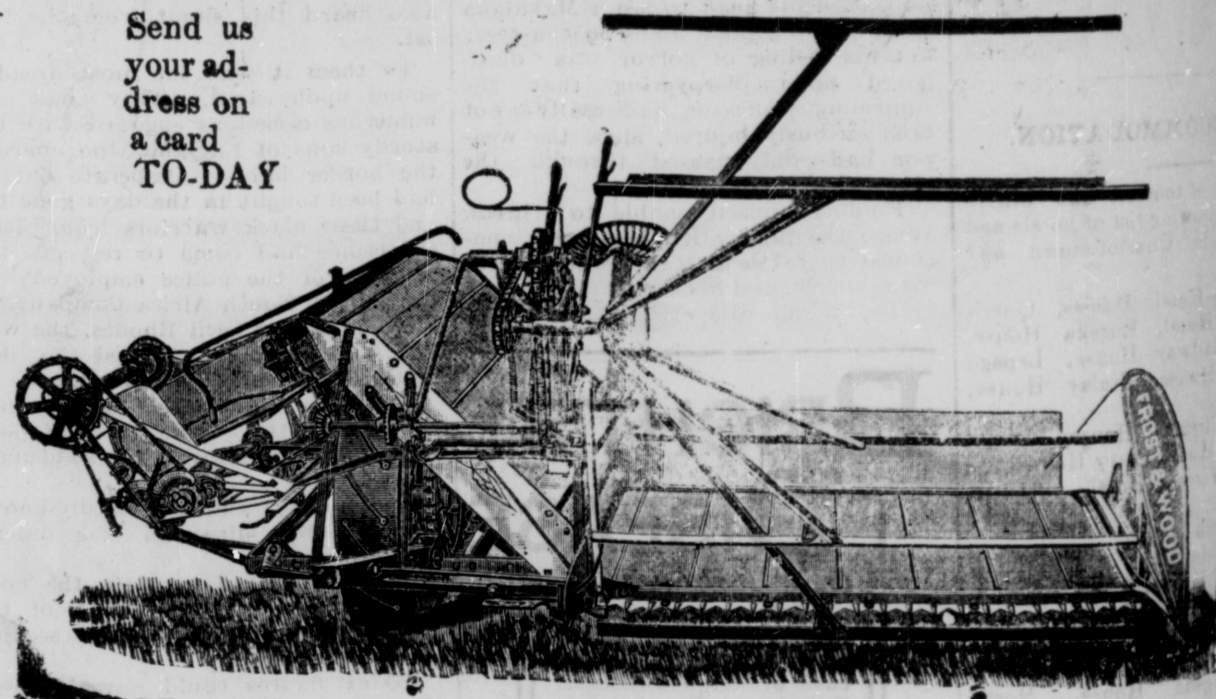
