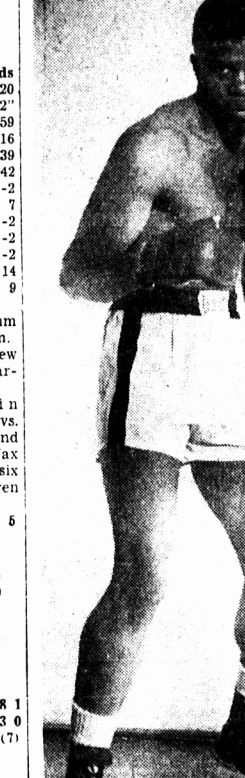

Detroit Tigers In 6-3 Victory Over Red Sox

If you think you have troubles, consider the case of Ned Garver. For four years he pitched for St. Louis Browns, a club so accustomed to adversity that it suffered dizzy spells whenever it rose higher than seventh place. Resigned to his fate, Garver won 20 games for the Browns in 1951, helping out with pinch-hitting on the side. In spite of his efforts, they finished last.

Then came Ned's big break. Early in 1952 he was traded to Detroit Tigers, a club with so many big hitters that they let their pitchers slack. Pitching, Garver promptly developed sore arm and when he returned to action, things had a familiar look. The Tigers were in last place.

They've been in last place ever since, descending to a new low last week as they compiled a 13-game losing streak—equalling the Tiger record of the black year of 1920, when they dropped their first 13 of the season.

So it was up to Garver to call a halt to proceedings and he did the job Monday, spacing eight hits to give the Tigers their first victory since May 22 by a 6-3 count over Boston Red Sox.

That gave Ned a 4-4 record for the year—nothing sensational, but fair enough for the club that has won only 11 games in 48.

While the rest of the American League had the day off, Milwaukee

Can Win In Any Round Says Edwards Trainer; Expect To Win-Poulton

Gil Edwards, the highly rated young middleweight from New York City and Harry "Kid" Poulton of Charlottetown, the leading contender for the Canadian Middleweight Boxing Championship went through their final workouts yesterday evening in preparation for tonight's ten round bout at the Forum.

Both fighters worked out for nearly a half hour before a good sized crowd of fight followers whose presence at the pre-fight drills indicated that a bumper house would be on hand tonight when the two boxers climb between the ropes for their long-awaited ten rounder.

Poulton, working out with LeRoy Jones and Buzzy Urquhart of Halifax went into the ring first and he was followed about 45 minutes later by Edwards who arrived in Charlottetown from Boston at six o'clock yesterday evening.

Edwards, a strong, sleek looking fighter whose rippling muscles indicate punching power and fine body coordination reported in the peak of physical condition. He is accompanied by his trainer Jack Priddy.

Poulton, looking fit and fine at 150 pounds was still favoring his shoulder during the workout. He reported that the shoulder, causing him pain from either a cold or a pulled muscle, was feeling better and that with further heat treatments last night it would be o.k. by fight time.

The 20-year old Edwards, who is rapidly advancing up the fistic ladder, has been working out for the past three weeks with Ralph "Tiger" Jones and Tuzoo Portuguese. The latter is the middleweight champion of Costa Rica.

Edwards is anxious to end tonight's fight as quickly as possible. "I want to get in there and get it over with soon. Anything can happen in this game and I don't want to get hurt," he stated.

His trainer 46 year old Jack Friday, who has been around boxing circles for over 30 years believes Edwards can end the fight whenever he wishes. "I look for an easy fight. Gil will knock him out any time he wants," commented Friday.

Poulton on the other hand, refused to make any definite predictions. "I expect to win," said Harry "But anything can happen in a fight."

Edwards has been fighting since he was about nine years old. In 1951 he won the golden gloves championship and he also won the Department of Parks City Championship in New York in the same year. He fought on a team with such well known performers as Johnny Saxton and Coley Wallace.

He turned pro in 1951 and since then he has had 17 pro fights. He had eight knock-outs last year and four of them were in Madison Square Garden where he is a crowd pleasing performer.

Edwards' face strongly resembles that of Joe Louis. He has narrow, swivel hips and powerful legs somewhat remindful of Sugar Ray Robinson. At the end of a half hour's shadow boxing and rope skipping yesterday he wasn't even puffing.

In addition to his masterful boxing ability Poulton will have experience on his side when he goes into the ring tonight. Harry

is a veteran of more than 100 professional fights and he has trained with some of the best boxers in the business.

Boxers with whom Harry has worked out with include Normie Hayes and Joe Rindone of Boston. In the winter of 1951 Poulton worked out extensively with Hayes and the latter went on to defeat Jake LaMotta and Robert Vollman. He also lost a 10 round decision to Charlie Humez who will fight Randy Turpin for the World's middleweight crown.

Poulton has also trained with Fritzke Pruden, Billy Fifield, Alar McFater and Arthur King of Toronto.

During the past several weeks he has trained with the McCorker Brothers, Cobey, Tom and Ace in the Shearwater Gymnasium at Halifax.

Poulton, always a highly regarded fighter, sprung up the fistic ladder this past winter when he went to Western Canada and held undefeated Lou Lawrence of Vancouver to a draw. His strong showing put him in line for a crack at Yvon Durelle's middleweight crown.

Neither Mitch Krswada nor Austin Squarebriggs worked out yesterday evening. Squarebriggs was working while Krswada, the "Two-Ton Tony" of the Maritimes took the afternoon off to go fishing. Both boys are ready to go in what should be an action-packed semi-final.

19-year-old LeRoy Jones, who fights Bud Ramsay of Summerside in a six round bout, has been in the fight business for five years. He has had about 30 professional fights and is one of the fistic winners in the Maritimes. He has been training at the Halifax Y.M.C.A. and came over to the Island yesterday by bus.

Buzzy Urquhart, who won the Maritime amateur welterweight championship in Halifax two weeks ago with an impressive showing, will be on hand for the fights and will challenge the winner of the Ramsay-Jones bout.

Danny McCormack, an ex-middleweight, will handle the main bout while Earl Nicholson will look after the opener and the showings. The judges will be George Hooper and John F. Connelly. Gus Longplie will be the announcer while Dr. R. F. Seaman and Dr. F. C. Dougan will be the timers.

Just before the main bout gets underway tonight records will be played of the Canadian and American National Anthems.

Tickets will go on sale at the Forum this afternoon at two o'clock. The opening fight between Tiger Steele and Warren Mugdrige will start at 8:30. The main bout should start about ten
