The Coming Session.

Parliament will meet on the 17th of January next. This is about a month earlier than usual.

It is, perhaps, too soon to indicate correctly the topics which will be discussed during the coming session. The National Policy will, no doubt, be attacked. But in view of the many notable surprises which the Opposition have experienced in the working out of that policy and the many reverses they have already met with respect to it, it is not likely that their attack will be either united or vigorous.

Of course the most will be made of the business complications which have resulted from the imprudence of the cotton manufacturers in consigning all their wares to one firm in Montreal; and it may be safely predicted that the Opposition, at least, will studiously avoid reference to the much more unhappy complications of a similar kind which exist in Free Trade England.

There will no doubt be an interesting discussion about the Canadian Pacific Railway Company,—their achievements during the year and the guarantee by the Government of their Capital Stock.

The Bill to equalize the qualifications of voters in Dominion Elections will, we presume, be again submitted during the coming session. There are, of course, many good reasons why the franchise of Canada should be revised and assimilated.
