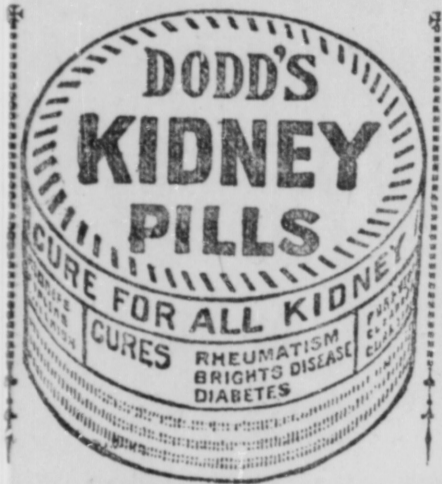

Prince Edward Island has many attractions for tourists, and it is expected that this season the influx of visitors will be very large.

HOW TO GET TO CHARLOTTETOWN

The steamer Halifax leaves Boston for Charlottetown every Saturday at noon and will be due at Charlottetown on Monday night.

The steamer City of Ghent plies between Halifax and Charlottetown each week, calling at several ports en route.

The steamers Coban, Bonavista, Campana, Tiber and Polino, of Montreal, also make Charlottetown a port of call.

Passengers for this Province coming by way of Pictou are brought to Charlottetown by the steamer Princess. Those coming by way of Point Du Chene connect with the steamer Northumberland, and may come through to Charlottetown by the mail special which leaves Summerside each evening immediately after the steamer reaches that port.

OBITUARY

The death of William P. Lewis of Cardigan Bridge P. E. I. calls for more than a passing notice, for he was a man of usefulness to the community in which he resided.

He was one of those sturdy lowland Scotchmen, who, emigrating to America in their early days, have done so much to build up the country of their adoption.

Mr. Lewis was born in 1831 at New Abbey Dumfriesshire, Scotland, and emigrated to America in 1853. The ship in which he sailed landed at Quebec and after remaining in that city for a couple of weeks, he sailed for Prince Edward Island. Shortly after arriving he located at Cardigan River, and built saw and cloth mills on a site at which was afterwards called Lewis' creek. He had learned the trade of the stone mason when in Scotland, and for several years took contracts for building stone walls and plastering.

After Cardigan Bridge was built in 1863, he opened a business establishment near the village that was sprung up, and for a number of years carried on ship building and a general store.

This not proving successful, he started the marble works that have since become so well known in King's County, and from that industry amassed a competence, being succeeded in it by his sons, David and William.

Mr. Lewis always took an active part in educational matters and for twenty years served as a school trustee, during which time great improvement was made. He was mainly instrumental in having the fine school building at Cardigan Bridge erected and having it classed as a graded school of the first class.

For nearly thirty years he was an active Magistrate, and people from all parts of the district in which he lived came to him when disputes arose. But his counsel was for amicable settlement in every case where it was possible; and by firmness and impartiality, he won the respect of all those who were not satisfied unless they got "law." He filled the position of sub-collector of customs for many years with entire satisfaction to the Department, and was granted a retiring allowance when sickness incapacitated him from continuing his duties.

Altogether his was a useful life. He was an excellent farmer and his homestead at Cardigan is an evidence of his ability to make two blades of grass grow where but one grew before. He was an enthusiastic lover of flowers and could tell more about them than many professors of botany. He was well informed in literature especially in Scottish poetry, and could recite, even in his later years, almost the whole of Allan Ramsay's "Gentle Shepherd," and Burns' master pieces.

After his visit to Scotland in 1879, where he went to see his relations, among whom was Dr. Lewis of Dumfries, who died only last winter, he could graphically describe the land of his forefathers, through which he travelled for some time. But enough has been said to show the man he was. In politics, Mr. Lewis was an active supporter of the Liberal party until the coalition of 1870 obliterated old lines. From that time while he took any part he gave his support to the Liberal Conservatives in their policy of railroad building etc., etc.

A conscientious supporter of the Roman Catholic religion, in many of whose churches can be seen specimens of his artistic work which he generously donated to them, he died fortified by its ministrations. He told the writer a few days previous to his decease, that death had no terrors for him, as he believed he had made his peace with his God.

The funeral on the 13th inst. at All Saints church, Cardigan Bridge, was most imposing. Over 100 wagons were in the procession, and the casket was covered with wreaths of flowers. The pall-bearers were Jas. E. MacDonald, Esq., M. L. A., Wm. McConnell, Esq., of Georgetown, John Hamilton, Esq., J. P. New Perth; Capt. Joseph McDonald, and Duncan McLaren, Cardigan, and Ronald McCormack, Esq., J. P., St. George's. A high mass with organ accompaniment was celebrated by Rev. J. C. McLean, P. P. St. George's, assisted by Rev. Dr. Morrison, Charlottetown, Rev. J. C. McLellan, rector St. Dunstan's College, Rev. A. McAlay, Morell, Rev. R. Gillis, St. Peters, with Rev. Dr. McMullan as organist.

His family who survive, include Mrs. Daniel McDonald, (Merchant,) Vernon River Bridge; Mrs. F. J. Revlock, of Minnesota; Mrs. H. McLellan of Vancouver, B. C.; Mrs. W. M. Flynn of Cardigan, and Miss Mary Lewis of Boston, U. S. A. who has been at home since the spring. The sons are James and William A. of Cardigan Bridge, and Douglas of North Dakota, who is doing an extensive business as a contractor and lumber merchant at Grand Forks. Two sons Thomas and David, preceded their father to the country from which no traveller returns, and his wife died about 18 years ago.
