### Accused Gets 30-Day Term

Previously convicted on the charge of possession of stolen goods, Llewellyn Andrew Cathcart, Charlottetown, was sentenced to 30 days in Queen's County Jail by Magistrate A.J. Haslam in city police court yesterday.

Two persons pleaded guilty to parking in metered parking spaces when the meters did not show time purchased, and each

was fined \$5 without costs or two days in jail.

Of four persons convicted of being drunk and incapable, two were each sentenced to 20 days, another was given a 20-day suspended sentence, and the fourth was given 10 days.

### Cars Damaged, Pole Is Snapped

Two persons escaped injury early this morning in an accident on the Malpeque Road which practically demolished one of the vehicles.

The mishap occurred at approximately 12:30 when Frank H. Prozenor of New Glasgow apparently lost control of his vehicle while proceeding to Charlottetown.

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## YMCA Membership Shows Big Increase With New Pool

"With the opening of the swimming pool addition and a completely refurbished building, the dream of those who made the initial plan some 18 years ago has finally become a reality," stated John L. Evens, general secretary, in his report to the YMCA annual meeting Tuesday night.

"Our swimming pool has been extremely active since it was put into service in April," the report continued, "with approximately 25,000 being its total attendance, and 1,798 individual swimming tests being passed. It has also been of great assistance to the Red Cross water safety program in giving all the courses for their instructors; the Boy Scouts, and the physical education department of Prince of Wales College."

A great increase in participation was noted, including a 100 per cent increase in registered non-members, and 79 per cent more members.

Loran J. MacLellan, president, in his report stated that in the financial field, building and construction have almost all been paid. A loan of \$30,436.09, outstanding in the bank will be paid during 1962 as the capital fund pledges are received. The 1961 maintenance campaign fell short of its objective, and the year ended with an operating deficit of \$4,831.80 he said. The second payment on the mortgage leaves a balance of \$14,500 which will be paid next year, leaving the organization with a new debt free building.

The report also included mention of fellowship students, the summer day camp, membership and program.

The statement of income and expenses for the year was presented. Reports were received from the Hi-Y central council, Centennial Y's Men's, Alpha

Y's Men's camp committee, Centennial Y's Menettes, Alpha Y's Menettes, Ladies Auxiliary, Phalanx Club, and the JOY Gra-Y.

Officers for 1961 were re-elected to serve for another term.

The three include Prince Edward Island's own P.E.I. Regiment Band, The Lord Beaverbrook Air Cadet Squadron Bugle Band from Fredericton, N.B. and the MacDougall All-Girls' Pipe Band from Glace Bay, N.S.

Mr. Fraser said negotiations are currently underway with

bands in Quebec City and Bangor, Me., and definite word on these entries is expected shortly. No difficulty is foreseen in securing about 10 bands for the giant parade that will likely include some 30 floats.

The MacDougall Pipe Band, Mr. Fraser pointed out, is of world championship caliber, having won the world's band title two years ago at a Lions International Convention in the U.S.A.

Last year, the pipers, numbering some 20 members, placed second to a brass band in the world's championships, but led all pipe bands entered.

The Fredericton Air Cadet bugle band has 35 members and it, too, is of championship quality having played a leading role in the Lord Beaverbrook No. 333 squadron's task in attaining the title of best Air Cadet squadron in Canada last year.

The band is reported expert in precision marching drill, and as a sidelight several of its members are skilled in the art of judo-defendo. It is likely that a demonstration of this defensive judo will be given at the exhibition grounds sometime during the day of the Gold Cup and Saucer Parade.
