Toronto Bumps N.Y. Rangers 5-3

NEW YORK (AP)—Toronto Maple Leafs blew a two-goal lead, but came back in the final 63 seconds of play to break a tie and defeat New York Rangers 5-3 in a National Hockey League game Sunday night in Madison Square Garden.

The Maple Leafs have been a jinx team to the Rangers this year, despite their lowly fifth-place position in the standings. They have won six games from the Rangers and lost only three while tying five others.

For the first seven minutes of the first period, it appeared that the Rangers might as well concede the game. Dick Duff slammed a goal home for the Leafs and was followed a few minutes later by Ron Stewart.

But Rangers had cut the deficit in half on a goal by Dave Creighton by the end of the first.

The Broadway Blues tied it on a slip-in shot by Dean Prentice when the second period was more than half over.

But before the Leafs ahead again before the period ran out. But again the Leafs could not stand the prosperity, and Camille Henry tied it again at 13:27 of the final

period. Sid Smith broke the tie at 18:57 and that finished the Rangers. George Armstrong added an insurance marker 20 seconds before the end.

Chevrefils Nets 30th Goal As Bruins Drop Hawks 6-2

BOSTON (AP)—Real Chevrefils became the Bruins' first 30-goal scorer in a decade as Boston trounced Chicago 6-2 Sunday night in a free-wheeling National Hockey League game which saw the home forces shatter their attendance record.

Chevrefils put the Bruins safely ahead 4-2 at 4:46 of the middle period on a shot from directly in front of the net.

It was his 30th of the year—the first since Bobby Bauer of Boston's famed Kraut line reached that figure in the 1946-47 campaign.

Boston's Defenceman Bob Armstrong got four assists and winger Johnny Peirson three while left wing Vic Stasiuk scored twice to tie the goal total to 22.

Don McKenney, the club's leading scorer with 58 points, contributed his 21st goal and 36th and 37th assists.

Lee Labine, linemate of Chevrefils and McKenney, knocked in his 16th goal while Cal Gardner had a goal and an assist.

Labine has scored seven times in the last five games.

Chicago was very much in the game for the first period. Glen Skov scored first at 3:08 of the opener and Eric Nesterenko made a goal before Labine tied it, 1-1, count and Stasiuk put the Bruins ahead to stay at 16:42.

Three of Boston's goals came with Chicago shorthanded.

Leafs Trample N.Y. 14-1; Habs And Boston Tie 2-2

Toronto Maple Leafs, kept out of the National Hockey League playoffs by the resurgence of the New York Rangers, Saturday night turned on their tormentors and administered a 14-1 drubbing to the Broadway Blues.

The fantastic near-record score overshadowed the only other weekend game—a 2-2 deadlock between Montreal Canadiens and Boston Bruins which left the Habs one point closer to the leading Detroit Red Wings.

Everybody on the Toronto club was represented in the scoring with a goal or an assist—except defenceman Jiminy Thompson and goalie Ed Chadwick.

Sid Smith and Brian Cullen led the attack with three-goal efforts. Ted Sloan and Ron Stewart tallied doubles. Singles came from Al MacNeil, George Armstrong, Dick Duff and Rudy Migay.

MURPHY SCORES

Ron Murphy, in the third period, saved New York from a shutout.

Canadians, six points behind Wings, scored on the efforts of Bernie Geoffrion and Henri Richard. Leo Labine and Fleming Mackell got the Boston markers.

The battered Lorne (Gump) Worsley, in the New York nets, turned aside 33 shots while admitting the 14. Chadwick handled 32 successfully.

For the Rangers, the 14-1 humiliation was the worst since the 15-0 drubbing administered by Detroit on Jan. 23, 1944. The score was the highest the Leafs ever racked up.

NEAR RECORD

Canadians hold the all-time NHL record for most goals scored by one team in one game. They set the mark in March 3, 1920, when they took the old Quebec Bulldogs 16-3.

The astronomical scoring did the Leafs no good. They lost that

fourth playoff spot to Rangers when Canadiens took the Toronto crew 8-4 in a mid-week encounter.

DETROIT (CP)—Taking advantage of two penalty breaks, Detroit Red Wings Sunday night captured their eighth National Hockey League title in nine years by edging the Montreal Canadiens 2-1 before 14,883 spectators at Olympia Stadium.

Defeat dropped the Canadiens into a tie for second place with Boston, a 6-3 win Sunday against Chicago.

Alex Delvecchio and John Bucyk scored the goals that whipped the Canadiens, the team that grabbed the Wings last season after the Detroiters had grabbed off seven straight NHL championships. Phil Goyette scored for Montreal.

Delvecchio, a six-year veteran of the Detroit club, got the payoff goal in the third period only 21 seconds after Boston's goal.

Goalie Geoffrion began serving a penalty for tripping.

The Canadiens, who had played a rugged 2-2 tie with Boston last night before making the long train ride to Detroit, came out strong in the first period.

The second period was all Detroit. Excell for a brief Montreal flurry near the end of the period, the action centered in the Canadiens zone.

The Detroit score came on a power play while Montreal's Doug Harvey was serving a holding penalty.
