Radical Changes Not Expected In Fall Fashions

PARIS, July 30 — (REU) — The Paris Fashion world is buzzing with speculation as to what new silhouette the Paris designers may be planning for the Autumn and Winter. Details will remain a closely-guarded secret until the new collections are shown soon, but fashion experts do not expect any radical change.

The general feeling is, however, that hemlines will drop, probably from one to two inches.

Christian Dior, when asked about his forthcoming collection, said he is "adopting a new conception of femininity which is gradually leading us towards more modern and scientific lines."

Jean Desses announced that hips and sleeves would be the focal points of his collection. He also said that shoulders will take on added importance through new cuts and treatments, although they will continue to follow natural lines, without artifice or exaggerated padding.

Desses feels that fashions is becoming more simple and that exaggeration and eccentricities have no place in the current style picture. Castillo, designing the Jeanne Lanvin collection is again using the supple fabrics which scored such a success in February. He calls them "Fabrics with Audacity" and is stressing many new textured and unusual weaves.

Poodle clothes and fleece will be starred for coats, while a newcomer called "Island Silk" with a soft satin finish is slated to debut for formal wear.

Fabrics provide an accurate tip as to the coat color chart. Two new ranges indicate that they will be strong. The "Fur Shades," newest name for the entire range from light buff, sand and wheat down through all the tans into deep red and earth browns, promise to be the leading colors. Greens will also stage a comeback.

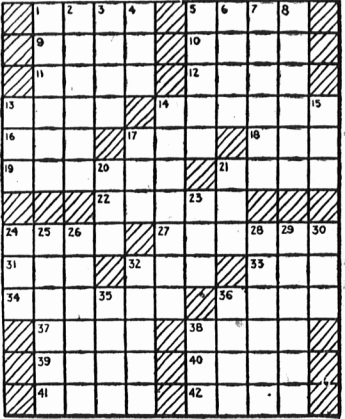

Health, Inc., is that 30 per cent of all patients who go to general hospitals and 50 per cent of all the patients who go to general physicians are suffering from mental illness and other personality disturbances, or physical illnesses with mental illness.

As we wonder over the above information we naturally think that mental illness is increasing at a rapid rate, but this is not necessarily the case. "The indications are that population growth, increased life span, more widespread recognition of illness and greater availability of hospitals are largely responsible for the increase."

However, we finish on an encouraging note because the chances of partial or total recovery from the most common of the serious mental illnesses—schizophrenia—have nearly doubled in the past 25 years due to the advance in knowledge and treatment of mental cases.
