COUNTY MAGISTRATE'S COURT—Charged with operating a motor vehicle while his ability was impaired by alcohol, a resident of Charlottetown was fined \$50 and costs or 60 days, and to pay damages of \$33 for damage done to another vehicle, by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet in the Queen's County Magistrate's Court on Wednesday. A resident of Alberton was fined \$15 and costs or 20 days for operating a truck exceeding 5,000 lbs. in weight at a speed greater than 30 M.P.H., and a resident of Marshfield, charged with driving to the common danger, was convicted on a lesser charge under the Highway Traffic Act, of failure to give way to an overtaking vehicle, and was reprimanded under provisions of Section 80 of the Act. The preliminary hearing of the manslaughter charge against Robert Rackham, Brookfield, was further adjourned until Sept. 26th, and a number of other cases were adjourned until Sept. 24th.

RECEIVE JET AIRCRAFT OTTAWA, Sept. 20 —(CP)—No. 416 Fighter Squadron at nearby Uplands Airport, which has been flying propeller-driven Mustang aircraft, has received two T33 jets in preparation for conversion shortly to F86 Sabre aircraft, the R. 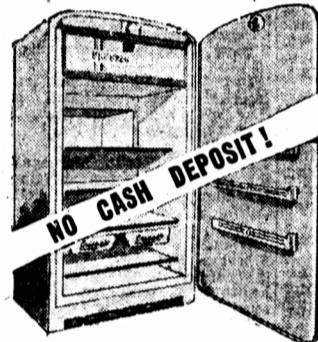

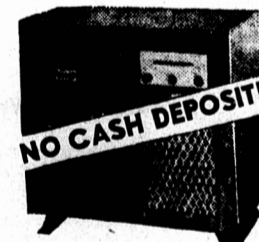
