Douglas Claims Danger Of Absorption By U.S.

OTTAWA (CP)—The Liberal government is pursuing a policy of creeping continentalism whose ultimate end is economic and political absorption by the United States, New Democratic Party Leader T. C. Douglas said Wednesday.

Mr. Douglas cited as examples the U.S.-Canada Columbia River Development Treaty, the U.S.-Canada auto trade pact, the apparent defeat of former finance minister Walter Gordon at the recent Liberal conference and the routing of a second natural gas pipeline through the U.S.

During the third day of an interim money supply debate in the Commons, he said he is not anti-American but believes there is a Canadian identity worth preserving.

Canada could not make a valuable independent contribution to the world as part of the U.S. because its decision-making powers would be "infinitesimal."

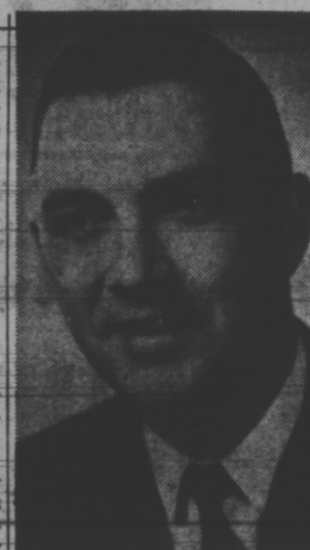

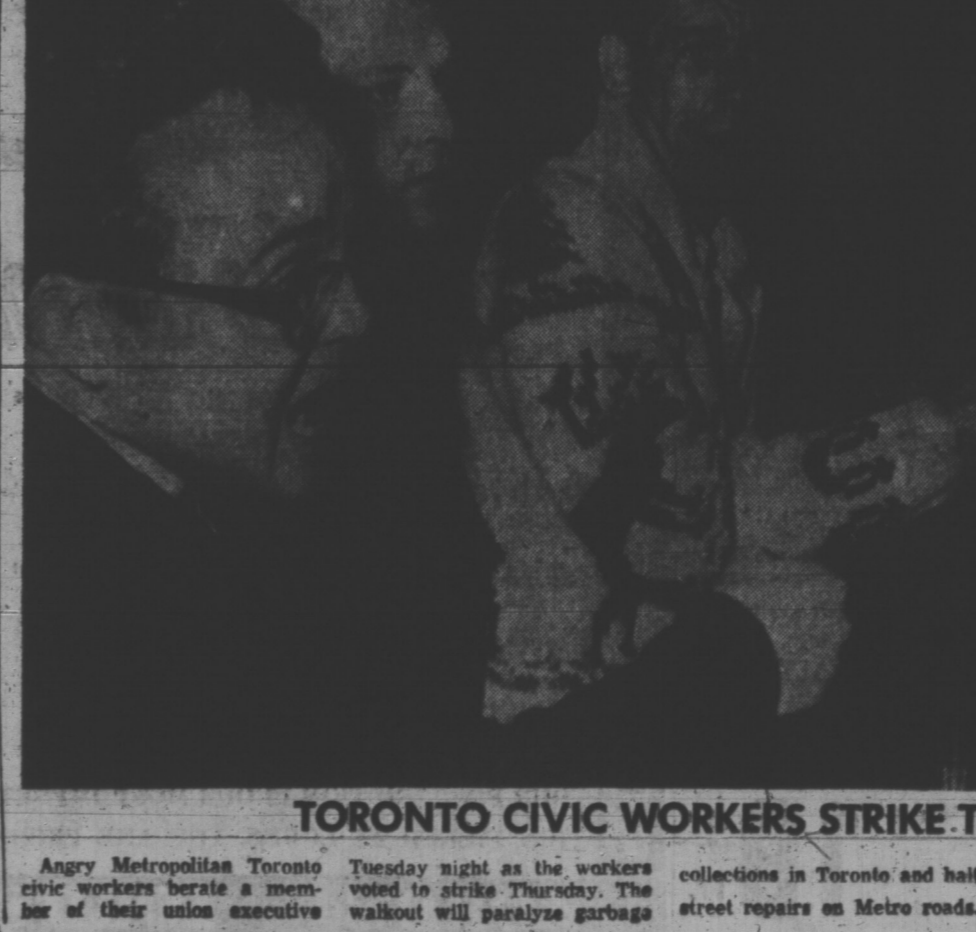
Slide Toll Set At 144

British Motor Corp. Faces Complete Tieup

LONDON (Reuters)—The giant British Motor Corp. and its 100,000 employees face the threat of a complete shutdown because of the dismissal of 26 men.

The dismissals, ordered because of a fall in domestic car purchases during Britain's current pay and price freeze, triggered a wildcat strike two weeks ago by the men's 1,200 fellow workers at a BMC factory turning out radiators, gas tanks and exhaust units.
