For most of the night she battled a turbulent sea and a 17-mile-an-hour west wind. When dawn broke, she was more than 12 miles out from the New York state shore and water conditions had started to improve. As the sun rose, the wind slackened. The water temperature was about 66 degrees. Hoping to gain the protection of the Toronto waterfront for the home stretch, she turned westward. Then a strong Toronto shore current washed her about six miles off course and still farther to the west but she was, able to turn and fight her way back to her planned route while waves smashed against her.

Boucher To Coach Ottawa Senators

OTTAWA — (CP) — George Boucher, 61-year-old former National Hockey League coach and defense star, will coach Ottawa Senators of the Quebec Hockey League this season. T. P. Gorman, owner of the Senators, announced Thursday that Boucher has accepted terms and would sign immediately. Boucher succeeds Walter Turk Broda, former Toronto NHLer, who will coach Toronto Mariboro juniors this season.

Boucher started on defence with the old Ottawa Senators and New York Rangers in the NHL. He coached the Ottawa team in the NHL for a season in the early 1930s and then handled the Ottawa Senators of the Quebec Hockey League for a three-year term before it turned professional. Under his direction the Senators won the Allan Cup in 1949 after losing in the finals the previous year to Edmonton.

Grand River, Tignish In 2nd Game Sunday

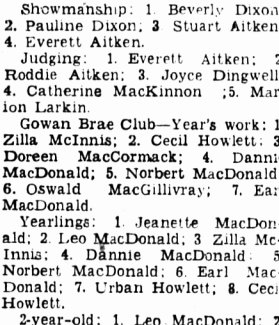

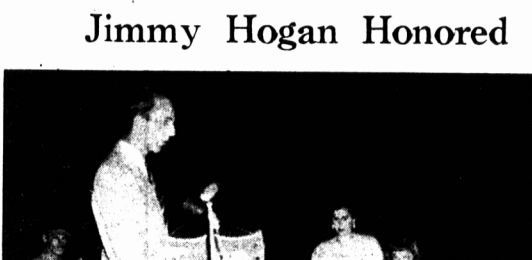
Presentation To Coach
