Guardianscope

 The recent letter re "Georgetown and Pictou" merits re-reading and study. It speaks with the voice of mature judgement and introspection—also with at least a more than ordinary knowledge of seafaring lore, and problems relating to transportation of freight by sea from this island.
 We must try to visualize the future of our island community, notwithstanding Sir Walter Scott's dictum "seek not to know thy future if happy thou would'st be."
 The Department of Industry in the Matheson Government has inaugurated an ambitious system of subsidizing factories to produce many of our farm and sea products, which can revolutionize our present system of exporting nearly all our production in its raw state. The starting of new industries at Souris, Bedouque, and Summerside will suggest a similar procedure by other. The "power of suggestion" is great.
 The starting of those new industries in Souris will be a pattern for the people in proximity and indeed for all the people—especially the youth of King's County. Disparaging comparisons with other countries are not nice. The next generation in King's can bring it back to its pristine predominance. It was a preferred part of St. John's Island (P.E.I.) in early days of French colonization. There were large and prosperous colonies at Saint Pierre (St. Peters) Nufrage, Trois Rivières (Georgetown), etc., many of those places retain their original French names. For nearly a half century they supplied grain and other provisions to the powerful French fortress of Louisbourg. Souris must have been one of those French colonies, because when the great plague of mice (Souris) struck the island, Souris was the hardest hit, hence the name.
 When Scottish, Irish and English emigrants came, the majority went to King's County. It was quite natural. There was plenty of cleared land on which the French colonists had been driven by their conquerors—principally the New Englanders—descendants of the "Holler than thow" Pilgrim fathers.
 It was the New Englanders who captured Louisbourg by a stratagem unorthodox in sieges up to that time. It seems strange that the English and French Colonists should carry on the Seven Years War of the Fatherland in the New World. The struggle for existence against a climate and were repulsed and imprisoned at Quebec, and Canada was saved by the steadfastness of the recently defeated and conquered Canadian French colonists and Canada was saved for the British Commonwealth.
 Georgetown harbor is rated as one of the real good harbors in the Atlantic coast, including Hampton Roads, Virginia, New York, Boston, Halifax, etc. The town is well laid out—Streets at right angles, the same as the older portion of Charlottetown. If memory of early Island history serves rightly, it was intended to be the capital of the Island.
 If those tentative arrangements with Mainland companies, spoken of in debates in the legislature materialize, Georgetown is likely to

May Raise W. V. A. \$10
 OTTAWA (CP)—The veterans affairs committee of the Commons Thursday night approved government legislation increasing war veterans allowance payments after putting down an opposition attempt to jock up the benefits still further.
 The committee decided to sit overtime in camera to draft its reports to the Commons. Indications were that opposition members would make a new attempt to attach recommendations to the report for payments higher than those specified in the bill.
 Completion of the committee study means the bill will go back for final Commons approval today and then to the Senate.
 The measure increases payments to Canada's 42,000 WVA recipients to \$60 from \$50 a month for single veterans and to \$108 from \$90 a month for married veterans or their widows. It comes into force on the first day of the next month following royal assent—which means that if it is pushed through Parliament before the end of March recipients will get the increased payments in April.
 Summer and winter traffic with the mainland appears to be increasing. The trend and necessity for greater speed is increasing.
 In the resolution sent to the Federal Government by the P. E. I. Legislature recently, dealing with the section requesting a new automobile and truck ferry, Premier Matheson advised that the hypothetical new boat be much faster than the ferry A B G W E I T.
 The exigencies of tourist and truck traffic require faster transport. They should shuttle the eight miles from pier to pier (Borden-Tormentine) in thirty minutes. When and if a ferry for Georgetown-Pictou is built, it should have a speed of at least 30 knots an hour. Ferries should be fast. We are getting behind the times. There were ferries on the Pacific Coast forty years ago faster than ours of the present day. We've been treated in a parsimonious manner in regard to communication with the Mainland. This Island is one of the principal "bread baskets" of Canada. We are entitled to the best in transportation.
 There is a big compensation due us and the other Maritime Provinces, up in the millions, in lieu of the handing over of the Eminent Domain—mineral rich N. W. Territory and Ungava to the five central Provinces. It will be bound to come in time. We must have faith in fair-mindedness of Federal representatives.

 All intercollegiate competition in the field of sport has terminated for this year as far as St. Dunstan's is concerned. In the intramural ranks only one sport remains to be played before the scholastic year ends—softball. Debating has reached its end, dramatics have stopped for the time being and the weekly socials, held at the Rollaway on Thursday afternoons, are suspended for the time being as we find ourselves enveloped in the holy season of Lent. Why the cessation of practically all activities? One of the main reasons is that we are approaching the "mid-term" or Easter exams, which this year are to be held on the fourth, fifth and sixth of April. These exams are worth twenty marks or ten per cent of the year's work. After the exams come the Easter holidays. In consequence of this cessation of activities only one news item of importance can be mentioned this week—and that is the basketball game between our highly rated Dorais-coached team and the Greenwood Flyers from Greenwood, Nova Scotia which will take place at 8.30 tonight in the college gym. It promises to be a hard fought game.
 In place of the regular little news items which take place in and around the college, this week you will be presented with the daily life of the average college student attending St. Dunstan's. Although there are some variances in the average day of the students in college years and those in High School, these differences will be overlooked in the following compilation and the college student will be treated more so than the high school student.
 At 7.00 a. m. the bell goes for rising and at 7.20 all students are expected to be in the college chapel for morning prayers.
