TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

President Garfield Shot An Assassin Fires Two Bullets At Him!!!

Though Badly Wounded He Is Still Alive!!!

Special Despatch to the Examiner:

HALIFAX, N. S., July 2.
A despatch from Washington, (dated 9.30 this morning) states that President Garfield was shot twice in the back, while buying a ticket at the depot on the Baltimore and Potomac Railway.
Although seriously injured, he was still alive.
The assassin was arrested.
No cause for the act has been assigned. Nor has the name of the assassin been given.
The people conducted themselves with coolness under the circumstances.
No further particulars yet.
