1967 Youth Parliament
Being Promoted Here

William S. Fair of Saskatoon is in the province this week to promote a Centenary Youth Parliament for 1967 and the establishment of youth organizations to train young persons for leadership.

He expects to meet with Premier Walter Shaw and says he hopes the premier will take initial steps in launching the idea and so maintain the island's tradition as a birthplace for national movements.

Support for the project has already been voiced by Gov. Gen. Georges F. Vanier, Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey, Rt. Hon. Louis St. Laurent, Prime Minister Pearson, Opposition Leader John Diefenbaker, Central Commissioner John Fisher and members of the House of Commons and Senate.

Selection of parliamentarians will be on the basis of oratory and literary skills, scholastic standing and group or community activity, and would be strictly non-partisan.

Sessions would be held during the summer of 1967. The parliament, which would discuss such topics as the foundation of principles of government, would, he said, stimulate young people to take an active interest in public affairs and become more aware of national and international problems confronting the government.

OPENED BY PRINCE?

It has been suggested that Prince Charles be invited to officiate at the opening of the parliament. Parliamentarians would likely be between 18 and 21 years of age.

Mr. Fair said he foresees the development of a special school for young Canadians who wish to make a career of public life. This, in turn, might lead to establishment of a world university.



New Vicar-Gen. Appointed
For Diocese Of Charlottetown

Very Rev. P.F. MacDonald, pastor of St. Pius X parish, Parkdale, has been appointed vicar-general for the diocese of Charlottetown.

This announcement was made last night by Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, bishop of Charlottetown.

Father MacDonald succeeds as vicar-general Monsignor J. A. Murphy who retired as pastor at Souris this spring because of ill health. However, Bishop MacEachern announced that Monsignor Murphy would act as honorary vicar-general during his lifetime.

The new vicar-general was born at Grand Tracadie Oct. 10, 1913, the son of the late William A. MacDonald and Mary M. Campbell. He attended school in Grand Tracadie before entering Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown. After two years at PWC he taught school in Glenora and Tracadie for several years. He then entered St. Dunstan's University, graduating from that institution in 1941. This fall he entered Holy Heart Seminary, Halifax, and was ordained to the priesthood at Our Lady of the Sacred Heart in Charlottetown in June 1945 by the late Bishop James Boyle.

After his ordination he was appointed curate at St. Dunstan's Basilica and was named chancellor of the diocese in 1960. In May 1963 he was named pastor of the Parkdale church.

Monsignor Murphy is a former director of St. Dunstan's University and at present is residing in the Sacred Heart Home in Charlottetown.

Historic Chamber Meet
Sees Time Reversed

One of the standard bits of equipment of the fantastic-type science fiction stories, the venerable "time machine" became a reality yesterday when television screens showed the original Fathers of Confederation at their deliberations in Historic Confederation Chamber in the Provincial Building.

It was the dramatic climax of a day of pageantry as the long-ago scene of history was re-enacted on the 100th anniversary of the original meeting in this city.

From the balcony of the historic room the modern counterpart of the Founding Fathers looked down on the scene and heard their predecessors outline a plan for union — the maintaining of which is part of the duties of the leaders of the 11 governments today.

Perhaps Prime Minister Lester Pearson and the Premiers of the 10 provinces obtained a new perspective on their own jobs by watching history in the making. Possibly it may have some influence on them as they resume deliberations today in session of the Dominion Provincial Premiers Conference for which they are gathered here.

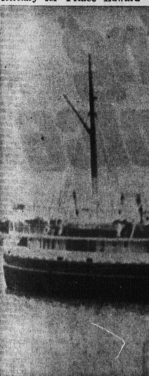
RECEIVES BURNS

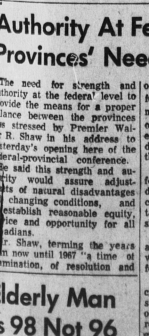

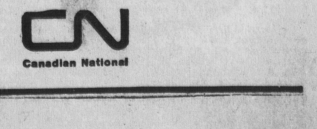
